Napoleon Love Letters Made Public

STOCKHOLM (Reuters) — Intimate details of 127 love letters from 19th century French empress Marie Louise to her famous husband, Napoleon Bonaparte, were made public Sunday.

The letters discovered in the royal family archives here, reflect her cooling passion for Napoleon just before she left him to become mistress of an Austrian general. Shortly afterwards Napoleon was defeated by the Duke of Wellington at Waterloo in 1815.

In one letter—written on gold-edged paper bearing a watermark of Napoleon's profile—Marie-Louise said that she was "very pleased" with a Gen. Neipperg, placed in charge of her while her husband was defending his crumbling empire.

LETTERS CEASE

A week later, in August of 1814, she became the general's lover and her correspondence with her husband ceased.

The empress married Napoleon after he had divorced Josephine, his first wife at the end of 1810. She often wrote to him three times


