"Paskha" Is Traditional At Easter Midnight Supper

By Ida Bailey Allen THROUGHOUT most of the world Easter is an important festival from the standpoint of religion and as a welcome to the burgeoning spring.

Opening the festival, Orthodox Catholic Russians round the world break the Lenten fast at an Easter midnight supper. TWO "MUSTS"

Whatever else may be served, two traditional special foods occupy the place of honor - "Paskha," a tall mold of specially prepared cottage cheese wreathed with flowers and a round loaf of frosted and nut-topped "Koulitch" cake, cut always in rounds.

The tempting frosted top is put on to act as a cover and eaten last, as a delectable morsel. This combination would be delightful to serve any time at "high tea" in the late afternoon at supper in the late evening. As the "Paskha" is made of cottage cheese, the combination not only makes a delectable but a balanced meal as well.

Measurements; let; recipes for 6

PASKHA (COTTAGE CHEESE MOLD) 2 1/2 lbs. cottage or pot cheese (bought in bulk) 1/4 tsp. salt 3 beaten eggs 1 c. melted butter or margarine 1 c. dairy sour cream 2 c. sugar 1/4 c. raisins (light or dark) 1 1/2 c. chopped citron or candied peel 1/4 c. heavy cream, whipped 1/4 tsp. pure vanilla extract Put cheese through coarse sieve into saucepan. Mix in all remaining ingredients except vanilla. Heat until it bubbles at edges, stir constantly.

Cream margarine or butter and additional sugar.

Beat eggs; set aside 1 tbsp. to use later. Blend eggs with creamed mixture. Stir in remaining flour, raisins, citron, orange and lemon peel. Beat with yeast mixture.

Turn into floured surface. Knead until smooth and elastic. Divide into 4 equal parts; round each into a ball.

Place each ball in separate well-oiled 1-lb. can, such as an empty baked bean or corned beef hash can; fill 1/2 full.

Cover with cloth. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, 45 min. or until dough doubles in size.

Brush tops with reserved beaten egg. Dust with bread crumbs.

Place cans on cookie sheet. Bake 35 min. in hot oven, 400 deg. F. Reduce heat to 350 deg. F.; bake for 35 to 40 min. longer of until cake shrinks from sides of can.

Remove from cans. Cool on wire rack. Glamour touch: Decorate with confectioners' sugar icing tinted pink and dust generously with chopped nut meats.

THE CHEF'S FROZEN PEACH-STRAWBERRY CUP This combination is a perfect accompaniment to Koulitch or a fine coffee cake.

Combine 1 pkg. each half-thawed frozen peaches and strawberries. With fork, stir in 1 tsp. lemon juice and 1 tsp. Angostura bitters.
