To Attend Agriculture Federation Meetings

Leaving this morning to attend a meeting of the Maritime Federation of Agriculture at Moncton are Messrs. Roland MacDonald, Southport; R. A. Profit, Freetown; Charles Yeo, Lot. 16; Donald A. MacDonald; J. L. Dewar, and Frank Jardine, Wilton Valley. On Saturday, Roland and Donald MacDonald will attend the Eastern Conference of the Federation of Agriculture in Montreal. Mr. Roland MacDonald will continue on to Regina where he will be joined by Mr. A. H. Hubley of Summerside, president of the P. E. I. Dairymen's Association. Mr. MacDonald is vice-president of that Association. In Regina the two will attend the annual meeting of the Dairy Farmers of Canada. Mr. MacDonald as a director of

Queen Charlotte High Home And School Ass'n. The regular monthly meeting of Queen Charlotte Home and School Association was held last evening at the library room of the High School. The president, Mr. J. E. H. Worth occupied the chair. A most interesting feature of the meeting was a panel discussion on "Teacher Recruitment." The members of the panel were Dr. Frank MacKinnon, chairman, Mr. Wendell Horton and Mrs. W. E. Scantlebury. Mr. Scantlebury believed it was a problem for the parents. Mr. Horton felt the shortage was caused by lack of encouragement from the parents to become teachers together with low salaries. Dr. MacKinnon stated that 20% of teachers in the province drop out each year. This, he considered, was far too large. In the course of his remarks he revealed some very interesting data regarding normal training at P.W.C. and teacher problems in general.

The meeting decided to send a resolution to City Council requesting fluoridation of the water. F. A. Larga, chairman of the band committee reported that seventy financial donations have been received to aid in purchase of band equipment. Mr. Ivo Cadmore informed the meeting that two instruments have already been purchased with these donations. The principal, Col. L. T. Lowther, gave a very informative address on "High School Aims and Program." In his opening remarks he stated that the purpose of Q.C.H.S. is to train minds and the policy is to carry forward this training through habits of reading and study. We seek to graduate students who have been led to form these habits. We require students to memorize in order that their minds may become capable of thought, often an idea is not fully grasped until many facts have been learned, and in turning over what has been learned, understanding grows until the light is seen.

Our policy is to lay special emphasis on use of words—not only in gathering the ideas of others through reading, but also in expressing ideas, so that others can understand what is meant, through writing. Proper habits of study are stressed, such as the habit of writing out what is to be learned, many times if necessary. We do not subscribe to the idea that to ask little of pupils means that little will be done. Our text books have been watered down so that less is expected of pupils. The result—the smaller the challenge, the less the effort. Better educated teachers are needed, not an easier course of study. Getting an education means work and work means study and regular study must be habitual. No matter what our students may do after they leave school the habit of tackling a job and staying at it will always stand them in good stead. The habit of work and study will develop a sense of duty necessary for any successful living.

Some plead inability to learn, that is not true in the grade 7 to 10 range of subject matter. What is lacking is the will to learn. Lowering of standards and too much coddling and pampering usually have this result. He who wants to learn.

The added cultural and recreational courses round out the program in fostering physical and social development but the purpose of this school is to train minds and our policy is directed to that end. The meeting was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.

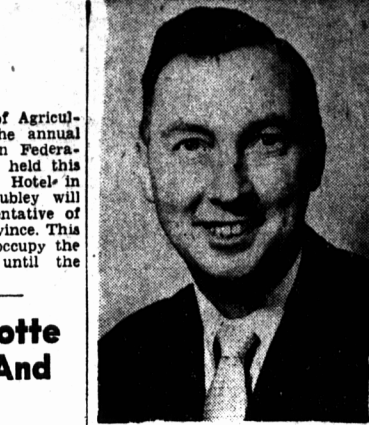

10 Years For Manslaughter SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP) - A jury in the Saint John circuit court Thursday night convicted Joseph Viennau, 32, of manslaughter. Mr. Justice C. T. Richard sentenced him to 10 years in penitentiary. Viennau had been charged with murdering Lydia Godin, 38, who died of a gunshot wound. The shooting occurred Nov. 1 in a bedroom shared with Viennau. An unsigned statement police said he made was admitted into evidence Thursday. It claimed the shooting was accidental and referred to the woman as his "common-law wife." The jury retired at 5:40 p.m. and reported its verdict at 9:15 p.m.

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Local Military Lieutenant-Colonel Rogers received his commission as a second lieutenant in the Prince Edward Island Highlanders in 1938. Early in 1940 he transferred to the West Nova Scotia Regiment and in March of that year proceeded overseas. He served continuously with that Regiment in England, Sicily and Italy, and was wounded at Ortona and in the Hitler Line. He was recommended for the Distinguished Service Order and was twice mentioned in dispatches. Before going to the continent he was promoted in England, in 1942 to the rank of Captain and, in 1943, in Sicily, received the promotion to Major and given command of the Company of his Regiment. On the formation of the Prince Edward Island Regiment in 1946 he was second in command, later taking over command in November 1948 following the promotion of the commanding officer, Lieutenant-Colonel W. W. Reid, to Brigadier. On leaving his Regiment at this time he will now serve as Deputy Commander and chief of staff of Brigadier G. G. K. Peake, DSO, ED, of 2 Militia Group. Lieutenant-Colonel Rogers is married and has three children, David, John and Richard. He married the former Miss Joan Fisher of Folkestone, Kent, England. He is presently on the staff of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Department of Veterans Affairs as Welfare Officer of this branch. Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Peake, C.D., is the son of Mrs. Arthur G. Peake and the late Lieutenant-Colonel Arthur G. Peake who rendered distinguished service in the First World War. Lieutenant-Colonel Peake received his commission in the Prince Edward Island Light Horse in 1940 and joined the active service in July 1941. While serving with the Halifax Rifles (23rd Army Tank) he was seconded to the Royal Military College, Kingston, where he was a member of the teaching staff of the Canadian War Intelligence Course. 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Predicts Capital Of Costa Rica Will Fall In Days

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A man describing himself as an unofficial agent for the forces seeking to overthrow the Costa Rica government says the capital, San Jose, probably will fall within three days. Lawrence D. Lee, 27, who said he is a wholesale pet supply dealer from Glendale, Calif., declared on his arrival here Wednesday night from Costa Rica that the opposition force is made up of 1,000 men armed with bazookas, machine-guns and mortars and is headed by Teodoro Picado Jr., 27, a Costa Rican graduate of West Point, N.Y., military academy in 1951. "This is Lee's story as told to newspaper men: Picado has been plotting the revolt for seven months from an undisclosed Central American sanctuary. Teodoro Picado Sr. was president of Costa Rica from 1944 to 1948 when he was ousted by Jose Figueres, the present president. Picado's assistant is Francisco Calderona Guardia, brother of the

He died in Woodstock Wednesday. Born in Saint John, N. B., De. Vincent held pastorates at Billtown, Isaac's Harbor, Sydney, Halifax and Tyne in Nova Scotia and Dorchester and Sackville in New Brunswick. He retired from the active ministry when 70 but subsequently held various interim pastorates. He is survived by his widow; three sons Rev. Gordon S. Vincent, Woodstock; Rev. A. C. Vincent, Saint John, and Winslow C. Vincent, Halifax; three daughters, Mrs. Harry Milner, Billtown, N.S.; Mrs. Horace C. Moigan, Woodville, N. B., and Mrs. George Berry, Reading, Mass.; 17 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Driving Snow And Cold In Western Europe LONDON, (Reuters) - Driving snow and cold air swept over western Europe Thursday, leaving 26 dead or missing, one ship in distress and floods in some areas. The storm covered the Scandinavian countries with deep drifts. It swirled across Britain during the day and onto the Continent. Temperatures dropped well below freezing. The bad weather forced the RAF to stop its search for two of its Shackleton bombers, missing since Tuesday night. The planes, each with a crew of nine, disappeared about 100 miles southwest of Ireland. HELICOPTER AIDS IN RESCUE A distress message was picked up from the Italian freighter Onorato saying her steering gear was out and she was drifting about 100 miles west-north-west of Queasant, Isle de France. The Norwegian freighter Norania reached the Norwegian vessel Bohus, which reported she had cracked "aft of midship" in the North Sea. The Norania said the Bohus needed no further assistance. A Dutch helicopter made five trips to rescue 15 men from the grounded Norwegian freighter Gatt off the hook of Holland. Seven men got ashore by sliding down a rope to a nearby pier. London was hit by heavy snow

Probe Death Of Kentville Baby KENTVILLE, N. S. (CP) - A coroner's jury Thursday recommended a full probe into the death of 18-month-old Suzanne Reid after deciding she died of silver nitrate poisoning. The youngster died Oct. 31 while being rushed to hospital here from her home at nearby Cannan. Her brother, David, 2 1/2, recovered in hospital from a similar illness. Their mother, Mrs. Robert Reid, was in hospital, having just given birth to a baby. Coroner H. C. Lindsay presided at the inquest and heard evidence that the poison was contained in a can of sugar purchased by the family from a delivery truck. Silver nitrate is commonly used in curing meat, in photography, and in some forms of medicine.

Most of Scotland was covered with snow, while in some coastal areas high tides pounded at sea defences. Paris was covered with an inch of snow.
