CANADIAN AND IMPERIAL DEFENCE

Is the course of a speech at London a few days ago, Sir Charles Tupper contended the idea that Canada had done nothing in her own defence, and nothing towards the defence of the Empire. He pointed out that Canada has expended on her canals and her great inter-oceanic line of railway from Halifax to Vancouver, works absolutely vital to the defence of this section of the Empire, \$141,000,000. In deepening the St. Lawrence, \$2,384,000 have been spent. So that, whereas a few years ago a vessel could reach nine feet of water only could draw the city of Montreal, the largest ocean steamer may now ride in safety into its harbor. We have also, he said, expended \$2,700,000 in the construction of graving docks, built under the superintendence of, and in concert with, Her Majesty's government, to receive or repairs the largest ocean steamers frequenting the Atlantic or the Pacific. We have paid \$7,000,000 to obtain the control and rights of the Hudson's Bay Company and organize the Northwest country for settlement, and it is well-known that Canada now offers 160 acres of this land free of charge to every British subject. We do more, we invite to these fertile acres the most vigorous members of all the continental countries of Europe that they may aid us in building up that land and become valiant supporters of the British Queen and British institutions.

REBELLION IN BRAZIL

Brazil is not entirely happy under a Republican form of government. Indeed there is a revolutionary spirit abroad which augurs ill for the stability of its democratic institutions. The present uprising in Rio Grande do Sul seems to be more dangerous than the reports indicate. A man of mature years and tried ability—Admiral Wandenkolk—is its leader. It is significant that the Brazilian authorities are carefully editing the despatches which are sent abroad. There is among the people a strong feeling in favor of secession and the formation of a Southern Republic. The cause of this is not clear. The new constitution of Brazil has removed many of the evils which had been subjects of popular complaint. A genuine federal republic was established upon the model of the United States. Under the old system the Central Government at Rio Janeiro used to appoint the Governors of provinces, but under the new constitution the governors are elected by the people of their respective states or provinces. The states are thus made independent as to their local affairs, and the people of the South can no longer complain that they are governed from Rio Janeiro. This reform, however, has not removed discontent in Rio Grande do Sul, where the revolutionary spirit has its real animus in the character of the people, which is largely separate and distinct from that of other Provinces of Brazil. According to appearances, the present outbreak is more formidable than any of the numerous previous insurrections that have kept that region of Brazil in a state of excitement, and the uprising appears to be seized upon by malcontents elsewhere as a nucleus for operations against national authority.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Astronomers in the United States are agitated over the appearance of a comet with a tail. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Trout catching at the East. Sir,—I beg to say that the statement made by your correspondent in a DAILY EXAMINER of last week, in reference to the netting and canning of trout at East Lake, is unfounded, for no netted trout were caught in East Lake factory. It is true that a few trout were caught there, but they were caught with a hook and line. The originators of the above mentioned statement are well-known. One of them may generally be found in Souris, but sometimes he spends his Sundays fishing at East Lake, and the other resides at East Lake and usually profits by such visits, even if they be made on Sunday, which is, in fact, the only day when they are permitted to fish. If those gentlemen hear of a trout being caught by anyone other than themselves, or those that it pays them to send there, they look upon it as an outrage. It is unnecessary for me to make further comment on this subject. Suffice it to say that we do not want the public to believe that all the workmen in connection with East Lake factory are outlaws, as those two gentlemen would have it appear for no other cause than that they caught with a hook and line a half dozen cans of trout.

BRITISH POLITICS.

Mr. Gladstone speaks in a hopeful tone of the Government Outlook. In a letter on the political outlook, which has been published, Mr. Gladstone says: "The majority returned by the electors of the United Kingdom at the general election has through courage, union and self-sacrifice exhibited both a numerical and a moral force abundantly sufficient to carry the Irish Government Bill through the House of Commons. His passage into the House of Lords will present to that assembly a great political issue. I will not anticipate the victory of prepossession over foresight, but whatever be the destiny of the bill in that assembly, its passage through the House of Commons elected less than a year ago for the very purpose of trying that issue, is a cardinal fact which immensely advances the measure, and, coming after seven years of closely sustained conflict, is decisive of its ultimate success. The self-interest imposed on itself by the majority has been manfully accepted by the constituencies, but I am not less confident than I was six months ago that this will not pass away without leaving recorded on the statute book British measures of great value and importance unless these should be prescribed by adverse influences, after having received the deliberate approval of the Commons."

THE STORM IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Crops Injured—Church Struck by Lightning. HALIFAX, July 20. A severe thunder and rain storm yesterday, did much damage to the crops through the Province. At Liverpool, Queen's County, there was a regular cyclone. Hallstones, the size of marbles, few breaking windows and damaging everything in their way. The Methodist church was struck by lightning, trees were uprooted in all directions and crops damaged to a considerable extent.

Fatal Railway Accident.

ANNOVER, N. B., July 20. An excursion party for the opening of a section of the Tobique Railway yesterday, was the cause of a most unhappy run. The train in which were Hon. Mr. Costigan, Secretary of State, Attorney-General Blair, Provincial Secretary Mitchell and Commissioner Emmerson, arrived at a winding curve three miles from Perth when it met with a trolley with two section men on it. The men tried to get the trolley off the track, but failed, and one of them, named McMenoman, was knocked to the ground and killed.
