New Unemployment Relief

OTTAWA (CP) An unemployment relief bill Wednesday was introduced in the Commons by Welfare Minister Martin.

Under terms of the legislation, worked out with six provinces in six meetings, the federal government will pay up to 90 per cent of relief costs paid out by the provinces and municipalities to needy unemployed.

The federal assistance will apply only after unemployment in a province has risen above 45 per cent of the province's total population. The legislation covers those not now covered by such welfare measures as unemployment insurance and includes farmers and fishermen.

Six provinces - Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia - have signed agreements with Ottawa which are retroactive to July 1, 1955.

Mr. Martin said one other province - he didn't identify it - is close to signature and that "possibly" two others will also sign.

Speaking on a resolution preparatory to introduction of the bill, Mr. Martin said the measure will write fins to the deadlock among federal, provincial and municipal governments over responsibility for unemployment relief. It would "ford assistance for any who cannot qualify for other benefits."

Mrs. Ellen Fairclough, Progressive Conservative labor spokesman, said that among provinces not signing are Ontario and Quebec and that therefore "there is a very large hole." A large part of the Canadian population would not be covered by the legislation.

Clarie Gillis CCF-Cape Breton, said a danger in the legislation is that administration of the Unemployment Insurance Act could be tightened up and those

disqualified told to look for help under provisions of the new measure.

Mr. Martin said the check on this would be that the provinces and municipalities themselves would determine the recipients and amount of the relief.

Mr. Gillis said the legislation is not altogether fair in that some provinces are better able than others to bear relief costs. Nova Scotia so far had stayed out of the scheme because it now pays no unemployment relief and would have to start doing so to obtain the federal share.

Some provinces operating "on a shoestring" would think twice about taking on new financial responsibility.

Unemployment relief should be an entirely federal responsibility, Mr. Gillis maintained, because there can be no equality as long as different provinces have different per capita incomes.

(Continued from page 1) 5. No different "degrees of murder." The present distinction between murder and manslaughter was quite clear and straightforward.

6. No redefinition of the crime of murder. The report said differences between murders can only be recognized by granting commutation in suitable circumstances.

7. That all convicted murderers should have the right of automatic appeal to provincial appeal courts.

8. That the accused should be given complete details of the crown's case before trial, that he should be provided with com-

petent defence counsel and assistance in obtaining evidence and that he should be obliged by law to plead not guilty.

The committee said a recent vote of the British House of Commons in favor of ending capital punishment is not a compelling reason for a change in the Canadian law. However, it recommended reconsideration of the question by another parliamentary committee within the next 10 years.

FAVOR ELECTROCUTION - The committee concluded that the most satisfactory method of execution is electrocution. Its recommendation was based on evidence that modern methods of electrocution produced instantaneous unconsciousness and painless death. If further investigation "should create doubt as to the possibility of employing electrocution in this manner then the committee considers it would be preferable to substitute the gas chamber as the method of execution."

The committee made no specific recommendation as to what form electrocution should take. However, the experts told that electrocution need not be carried out in an electric chair and that simpler and less repulsive facilities could be used. They proposed that condemned persons could be strapped to a table.
