

# Russia Prepared To Accept Realities On German Arms

GENEVA (AP)—Western delegates to the Big Four parley said Wednesday night they interpreted Soviet Premier Bulganin's draft treaty on European security as giving tacit recognition of West Germany's right to rearm.

A French delegation spokesman said Bulganin's draft showed the Soviet Union is "prepared to accept realities."

"The draft treaty can be considered as tacit recognition of the 12 divisions allowed West Germany under the Paris agreements," he said.

U.S. diplomats agreed with this interpretation.

The Britons said they felt the Russians' basic attitude has not really changed, but that after having put this position forward publicly the Russians would no longer be able to maintain that the 12 divisions allowed West Germany under last winter's Paris agreements precluded negotiation on the possible reunification of Germany.

The draft treaty proposes that both Communist East Germany and the Bonn republic become members of a broad, 50-year Euro-

pean security pact pending the unification of Germany.

It also calls for a freeze on armies in Europe, an East-West non-aggression pledge and eventual disbandment of the Atlantic and Warsaw alliances.

## Among The Farmers

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

THE DROUGHT ENDS

In our last newsletter we referred to the long period of hot, dry weather and the excellent conditions for haymaking. We suggested that the time had arrived when other crops would start to suffer unless moisture was forthcoming. Our observations apparently made an impression upon the weather authorities for on Saturday the Maritime Provinces were treated to a generous rainfall and the showery weather continued for a number of days. True it is that a quantity of hay has been damaged but the benefits are all on the good side as pastures, grain crops, roots and potatoes in particular have taken on a new lease of life. The potato crop looks at its best with a vigorous growth of healthy vine now coming into the blossoming period and making potato fields a real show of beauty.

POTATO PROSPECTS

In common with Prince Edward Island, most other potato growing areas in the Eastern part of the continent have been enjoying ideal growing conditions which points to the production of a possibly

year. July is the month in which these agreements are usually paid and lists have been prepared and are now being mailed to each business concern involved. The present year marks the sixth in which this deduction has been made. It will therefore be well established in the farmers' mind and the deduction will in very rare cases be any cause for question on the part of the member. Once the deduction has been made and the list of members returned to the Federation Office, membership cards are mailed directly.

LEADERSHIP COURSES

While the beginning of the Farm Forum Season is still 3½ months away, nevertheless plans are already being made towards the holding of a leadership course in the Maritime Provinces for those who may be associated with this programme or who may be in a position to assist locally with its development.

While the success of a study group movement depends in a large part upon the members involved, nevertheless the people in key or official positions play a very important part in guiding

and assisting local officials. While one of the prime purposes of Farm Forum is the development of leadership at the community level, there is nevertheless a crying need for competent people to promote the movement. Early October has already been chosen as a date for these courses with the location likely being on the Mainland, either in the Sackville or Shediac area. It is hoped to encourage attendance on the part of persons who may be interested provincially as well as by those who will be involved at the local level who may also be in a position to carry out organization in their own neighbourhood.

THEY RISE AND FALL

While farm organization history in this country does not go back much more than fifty years, nevertheless, farm people in that time have acquired a great deal of experience in experimenting with the setting up, operating and in perhaps too many cases being in attendance at the dissolution of such ventures. Each new organization was the result of a need

and of action by people with initiative and foresight who look forward to improvement. Some of the groups referred to were entirely educational in nature while others were commercial. These have had their ups and downs financially and otherwise, depending upon the efficiency of management or upon the interest and support of their customers. Some of the organizations which passed away rendered an outstanding service and their loss was clearly a mistake.

In this category falls the old Egg and Poultry Association which came on the scene at a time when Prince Edward Island eggs had acquired the dubious reputation of being the worst in Canada. The Egg Circles soon corrected this and it was not until the 30's that economic pressure led the producers to dig a pit under the Organization into which it tumbled. Once again the egg industry in the Province fell victim of the error of decentralization in packing and marketing and now finds itself in a situation something less than ideal.
