## Defence Funds Are Available For Square Dancing, Picnics

OTTAWA (CP)—A recent defence department order makes it possible for the armed forces to use public funds for recreation such as square dancing, picnics and pet contests.

For recreation purposes, the order says, commanding officers of stations and units may authorize use of armed forces vehicles "for journeys within a radius of 30 miles."

Commanding officers may also authorize "the granting of temporary duty allowances" for personnel seeking recreation.

They may also approve use of armed forces transport to carry servicemen's families and "incident civilian employees" to "sports fields, playgrounds and recreational areas."

Recreation is defined in the order, issued Oct. 22, as "a free choice of participation in leisure activity which is satisfying and enjoyable and which contributes to the purposeful fulfillment of the individual."

DEFINES PROGRAMS  
Recreation programs as set out in the order include:

"Social and entertainment: This may be described as activities involving groups of people which serve to provide companionship and friendly association.

e.g. square and folk dancing, picnics, organized tours, children's parties, pet contests and hobby shows.

"Cultural: This includes such areas of interest as amateur dramatics, puppetry, public speaking, discussion groups, musical appreciation and choirs."

A separate order deals with physical fitness in the armed forces.

All ranks must undergo "minimum physical efficiency standards" twice a year.

Here are the minimum standards:

Under 30 years of age—seven chin-ups, 35 sit-ups in two minutes and a 600-yard run in 180 seconds;

Between 30 and 39—five chin-ups, 28 sit-ups in two minutes and 600 yards in 170 seconds;

Age 40 and over—four chin-ups, 21 sit-ups in two minutes and 300 yards in 90 seconds.

The tests are stiffer for a man in an army field unit. He must cover 10 miles in 120 minutes in full battle dress, surmount a six-foot wall, clear a nine-foot ditch, "land on both feet" and carry a man of approximately the same weight 200 yards.

## Named To Head Sydney Office

SYDNEY — Gerald S. Keating, a third-generation CN railroader, has been named manager of Canadian National Telecommunications at Sydney. His grandfather, Captain Red Keating, commanded the first CNR Scotia ferry across the Strait of Canso at the turn of the century.

Mr. Keating's appointment was announced by William Bellamy, superintendent of CN's Maritime district. Mr. Keating succeeds A. Colin Dean, promoted manager at Halifax.

## Death Appeal Is Dismissed

FREDERICTON (CP) — The appeal division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court Thursday dismissed an appeal by Reginald John Colpitts, 20, of Moncton against his conviction and subsequent death sentence on a charge of capital murder.

It was Colpitts' second appeal to the New Brunswick Supreme Court. An earlier appeal was also turned down.

Charged with the Sept. 23, 1964 stabbing death of E. J. Masterton of Moncton, a 49-year-old guard at the federal penitentiary at Dorchester, N.B., Colpitts was found guilty of capital murder and sentenced to hang last March 3.

The Supreme Court of Canada upheld his appeal after two stays of execution were granted and after the New Brunswick Supreme Court had dismissed his case.

Following a new trial ordered by the Supreme Court of Canada, Colpitts was convicted Oct. 29 at St. Joseph, N.B., and sentenced to hang Jan. 19 by Chief Justice Adrien J. Cormier of the New Brunswick Supreme Court's Queen's Bench division. The jury gave no recommendation for clemency.

## Y's Men Review Training Program

MONTAGUE — Over 30 Y's men and their wives were present for the weekly dinner meeting of the Montague club last evening. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church hall. The ladies of the church served a hot turkey dinner to the group.

Leonard Munroe, chairman of the meeting following the dinner introduced Floyd Buell from the department of education who explained the small business management training program which is available and could be sponsored by the Y's Men Club in Montague.

The courses could be held for two hours once or twice a week or in a manner which could be more suitable to the area. The courses available include management, accounting, marketing, purchasing, business law, handling of personnel and several others.

If the club were to sponsor the program, Mr. Buell's department would supply all the books and other material required and teachers if not available locally. He strongly urged, however, that local businessmen such as bankers and teachers be used if possible. A fee could be charged to those taking part and this would most likely cover the cost of teachers, rentals, and advertising. He stated his department would do all possible to assist. If the Y's Men were to take it on, the Y's Men club members had discussed the project at a previous meeting and it was the opinion of most that this would be an ideal program for a good many of its members as most are in business in Montague. If a decision is reached to sponsor the program it will commence shortly after the New Year.
