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Postal Service Discussed By S'side Board Of Trade

At the regular monthly meeting
of the Summerside Board of
Trade held last evening, Mr. J. F.
Arnett introduced the matter of
service at the Summerside Post
Office, which he contended was
far from satisfactory. Mr. Arnett
said that it had been the general
feeling that when the post office
was located in the new federal
building that many of the causes
of complaint would disappear. He
referred in particular to the fact
that the doors leading to the pub-
lic lobby, where the private mail
boxes are located, are locked up
at ten o'clock at night as well as
all holidays and Sundays as well
and he expressed the opinion that
this portion of the building should
be open at least until eleven
o'clock at night and on holidays
and Sundays also.

Mr. Arnett referred to the in-
efficient service given the public
and said that while he realized
that the post office was short-
handed at present, something
should be done to improve the
service. He cited instances of his
mail being placed in his box, late,
which had made it difficult for
his company to fill orders for
goods on time, also of a consider-
able number of letters which were
put in his box belonging to other
people which indicated that the
staff in the office was not giving
good service.

The air and mail committee was
asked to confer with Mr. Allen,
the postmaster, on these matters.
Mr. Herbert Stright of this
committee, said that in the past
when the committee had gone to
Mr. Allen with matters needing
adjustment he had always re-
ceived the fullest cooperation from
him. Mr. Stright also advised that
the present staff at the office was
to be augmented by five to eight
additional members, starting on
December 15th, to take care of the
Christmas rush.

It was pointed out by several
members that the vents which had
been placed in the walls at the
postoffice in the outer lobby, have
not been effective in preventing
mail from being sucked back into
the inside of the post office when-
ever the main doors are opened by
other persons entering the build-
ing. Mr. Stright said he under-
stood that an extra set of doors
would be placed on the Church
Street entrance which it is believed
will prevent the circulation of air
currents in the lobby from forcing
the mail back into the staff por-
tion of the building as soon as a
box holder opens his box.

Discuss Nfld. Trade
Mr. T. J. Inman of the Agricul-
ture committee referred to the
matter of Prince Edward Island
Newfoundland trade which he said
was very extensive and that a
large portion of it came from
Prince County. He pointed out
that all the produce shipped from
Prince County must be sent to
Charlottetown as this is the only
port of call of the government
subsidized boat. He said that with
the greatly increased facilities at
the Summerside Marine Wharf
when completed, it would be most
advantageous to have this boat
call at Summerside and pick up
the cargo here.

The meeting asked Mr. Inman
to gather facts and figures from

other shippers in this county re-
garding the amount of produce
shipped from Prince County via
Charlottetown and to present this
data at a later meeting of the
board, this data to form the basis
of a resolution to be sent to the
proper authorities asking that
Summerside be made a port of
call.

The president read a letter from
radio station CJRW, Summerside,
advising the board that station
OKCW, Moncton, had made ap-
plication to increase its power out-
put and that if the application is
granted it would put CJRW out of
business. The communication
pointed out that the great amount
of public service which the local
station gave to the community,
how it has encouraged tourist
trade by means of its interviews
with tourists at the carterly and it
requested the board to add its
voice in protest against such an
application being granted by the
CBC. No action on this matter
was taken at last night's meeting.

this to mean a greater need of
more members in the Legion which
today has a membership of ap-
proximately 1300 out of a total of
some 10,000 veterans. The work of
the Legion, he said, requires the
services of men willing to put forth
the effort to foster and promote
Legion ideals and to assist actively
in its work. He congratulated the
local branches on the work which
they had accomplished, and felt
that it would continue so in the
future.

Prior to Mr. Cannon's address,
Rev. W. A. Paterson, Georgetown,
was elected deputy zone command-
er, and Mr. J. M. Clair, Montague,
zone secretary.

Mr. J. S. Walker, provincial sec-
retary, also spoke respecting in-
creased membership, and was of
the opinion that membership in the
Legion was a great factor leading
to the development of the mem-
ber and necessarily to the Legion
body. He was interested, he said, to
learn that the local Legion
branches were concerning them-
selves with the children of their
districts. The training of youth is a
vital program today, he said, in any
organization, and it is the re-
sponsibility of men and women to
train children for their future place
as citizens of the nation. He felt
that the Legion could and should
assist actively in this necessary
cause through the promotion of
athletics and sponsoring scouting
and other groups.

Major John A. MacDonald, M. L.
A., provincial representative on
Dominion Command, re-emphasized
the need of a larger membership,
since through this, he said, the
Dominion Command would be
speaking for a greater representa-
tive body, and consequently would
 wield a far greater influence in
legislation concerning veterans. He
thought that a drive for more mem-
bers should get underway immedi-
ately in the three branches. Major
MacDonald also explained to the
members the Dominion Command
Command service bureau, which, he
said, was at the disposal of veter-
ans in assisting them with their
problems.
