Wm. Parks & Son, proprietors, with their usual enterprise, are again to the front. They have a small but well selected stock of some of their manufactures, comprising single yarns, knitting cotton, carpet warp, and fancy woollen shirtings.

The Land Question in Scotland.

MR. MURDOCH—THE HIGHLANDER.

For so he delights to speak of himself. The man. There is nothing extraordinary in his appearance. There is keenness and fire in his eye, and his whole make up tells us that he is resolute and fearless.

Mr. Murdoch made it plain that landlordism was a growth, and not the conception of tyrants. He depicted very graphically its increase; showed how money and aristocratic position gained on uneducated labor and low position; how, by a process of this kind, more and more, the small properties became absorbed by the larger, and the rich and influential gained upon the poor and obscure, until the miserable state of things now seen in the different parts of the Highlands was reached.

The best lands remain uncultivated, or given up as fields of sport and game, and the poor man and his family must retire to bogs or mountains to struggle for a miserable existence. Beside the evils clearly manifest and more generally connected with such a system of things as this indicates, the lecturer gave a striking case of hardship.

The moral results of landlordism were referred to as horrible. Men and women crowded together, ignorant, without the stimulant of hope to rise, or shame that makes a man fear to sink lower.

Mr. Murdoch has not yet given us his remedy or the way to bring it about. His idea, clearly, as we could gather it, was that the tiller of the soil should be the owner of it.

A hint the lecturer gave told us a significant tale. He said he would go home and tell his people that all the clans were united here. Disunion, classism, division among the people, all this has made them weak—an easy prey to crafty, designing speculators' influence.

THE wheat crop of the United States will yield twenty-five per cent. less than that of last year. The decrease is owing to the unfavorable weather. Doubtless the N. P. will be held responsible for any increase in the cost of the manufactured article in Canada.—Moncton Times.

THE gold yield of the Nova Scotia mines from 1862 to 1880 inclusive was, by the official reports, 310,606 ozs., 5 dwts., 5 grs.; valued at \$20 per ounce, \$6,212,125; the labor was 3,036,883 days at \$1.25, equal to \$3,796,004; the royalty 2 per cent on the oz. at \$18 was less than \$124,242. As many good claims are free we have, therefore, a balance of \$2,287,279 to represent returns on capital, was and tear of machinery and supplies.—Herald.

LOBSTER FISHING.—Yesterday, at the Courthouse, Souris, before J. Hunter Duvar, Esq., Inspector of Fisheries, on the complaint of Fishery Warden, J. D. McDonald, vs. Messrs. McCallum and Fraser, the defendants were fined \$50.00 and costs, for not having taken up their lobster traps within reasonable time after 20th August last.

Personal.

GUTEAUX is about sick of the world. He is not cheered by anything or anybody, and does not care even for the light of day and the fresh breezes of heaven.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER in his speech at Yale, British Columbia, expressed great satisfaction that the "back of the heaviest section of the work" on the Canada Mountain portion of the Pacific Railway had been effectually broken, and regarded the result as itself an irrefragable proof that the remaining difficulties were not by any means insuperable.

A DISPATCH from London announces the death of John Karlake, one of the most prominent of English jurists. He was sixty years old, having been born at Benchman, near Croxden, in 1821. Educated at Harrow School, he was called to the Bar at the Middle Temple at the age of 25, and soon rose to eminence. He obtained a silk gown just as he reached his fortieth birthday, and in 1867 was returned to Parliament as member for Andover. In 1873 the borough of Huntingdon returned him, and as its representative he served till 1876. As early as November 30, 1866, he was made Solicitor-General, and was Attorney-General from July, 1867, to December, 1868. He was a close friend of Disraeli, and when the latter was made Prime Minister one of his first acts was to return the Attorney-Generalship to Sir John, who, however, was forced to resign after a few months' service, his eyesight failing him. He soon became totally blind.

SIR PATRICK McDONNELL, who is mentioned in the Standard as the interim Governor-General when Lord Lorne pays his proposed visit to England, first established his fame as the head of the Intelligence branch, a new branch of the army which has sprung into existence since the Franco-German war. Before that time the military authorities could not have provided the army with a map of any part of the empire on a scale large enough to be of use to the private soldier. Now, the whole of England has been so mapped out that by a study of the maps any soldier could tell what he ought to do, where he is going, &c. The same system has been applied to different parts of the Empire, to such an extent that if a war breaks out to-day in any part, to-morrow the London newspapers would be able to supply a topographical map of the scene of war, accurate in all its details, the whole supplied from the Intelligence Department, where, as the surveys are completed, the plans and maps are pigeon-holed, and ready for service at a moment's notice.

NEWS NOTES.

Snow has fallen continuously for three days in Tyrol.

The Bank of England has fixed the minimum rate of discount at 5 per cent.

A serious rising is reported as having occurred in Zululand.

It is thought that Servia will shortly be elevated to the position of a kingdom.

Owing to the heavy frost in South Carolina the second growth cotton will be destroyed.

"What is the worst thing about riches?" asked the Sunday school superintendent. And the new boy said, "Not having any."

The catch of codfish and herring on the coast of Cape Breton has been larger this season than for many years. The mackerel catch is good.

The London Post hints that a disagreement between England and France on the Egyptian question had something to do with the suspension of the commercial treaty negotiations.

Determined to stop if possible the flow of gold to America, the Bank of England has raised the rate of discount from four to five per cent, making a total increase of two per cent. in two months.

A private letter from Panama, referring to the wretchedly unhealthy condition of the country, and the mortality among persons engaged in the new canal, says: "Another canal official died here to-day of yellow fever. Seventeen prominent men have died since January 30th, 1881, nearly all of fever. The laborers are dying by dozens of the same disease, but no record of any kind is kept of them."

Out in Tacoma, Washington Territory, necessity is the mother of invention." The inhabitants felt a yearning for antiquity. They desired, like the people of Europe, to worship in a fanes with a flavor of the antique about it. So they cut the top off of a great fir-tree, forty feet from the ground, fixed a cross and bell on it, turned it into a steeple, around which they built their log church. The rings of the tree show that it is 300 years old.

The land part of the Canadian Pacific railway syndicate's work is progressing favourably. There are nearly 1,500 applicants for land, and these are stated to be mostly well-to-do farmers from Ontario and England. These are the very people to form the backbone of the population of the North-West. Enviroined as that country may be with possible difficulties in the future, it is well for Canada to see that the new population is thoroughly permeated with love for British institutions.
