BIRTHS, DEATHS DECLINE

OTTAWA (CP)—The number of November births registered in Canada declined to 36,990 from 38,057 a year earlier, marriages to 10,667 from 11,875 and deaths to 10,217 from 12,058, the bureau of statistics said Thursday. In the January - November period births totalled 438,067 compared to 439,585 a year ago, marriages 125,056 to 126,349 and deaths 121,960 to 125,832.

## Change In Judging Methods Is Advocated By Club Pres.

Judging the various breed classes at the next Provincial Exhibition may be spread over two consecutive days, if a recommendation advocated by Major MacRae at Wednesday's annual meeting of the P.E.I. Ayrshire Breeders' Club finds favor with the other breed associations and exhibition directors.

Mr. MacRae pointed out that a great deal of time was wasted each year while new classes were assembled and brought to the show ring. These recurrent delays resulted in waning spectator interest he said.

To finish judging each breed in one day the most important classes often did not appear until late in the evening.

DISADVANTAGE Showing Holsteins and Ayrshires alternately each day would eliminate these disadvantages common to both classes he said.

In addition, a two day show would able exhibitors to present their milkers to much better advantage, Mr. MacRae emphasized.

The club agreed with Major MacRae's suggestion and appointed a three-member committee to interview the other Clubs and the directors of the Exhibition. Named to serve on this committee were: Major MacRae, Andrew MacRae, and Colonel F. I. Andrew.

Nominated to be Ayrshire judges at the local 'Ex in 1959 were Alex Sutherland and Gilbert MacMillan, Mr. Sutherland being given the nod for first choice.

## Drive To Promote 4-H Clubs Is Announced By Breeders

If 4-H Jersey Calf Clubs fail to increase in the Province in the coming year, it will not be because of any lack of interest and effort on the part of the local senior association.

An intensive promotional campaign designed to increase the number of junior clubs in the Province will be carried out next year.

This decision was arrived at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Jersey Breeders' Club held at the Board Room of the provincial building annex yesterday afternoon.

The president, Ernest Underhay, Bay Fortune, presided.

BONUS DISCONTINUED At yesterday's meeting the senior association also decided to discontinue bonusing new breeders except calf club members. Heretofore a bonus of \$25 had been paid for each animal registered by each new entrant in the Jersey field.

In order to encourage further participation of Island Jersey breeders in the Royal Winter Fair, a motion calling for additional financial aid to those exhibiting there was adopted.

The club nominated Norman Bagg, Edgerley, Ontario, and Lloyd Pickard, Alberta to judge the Jerseys at the 1959 Provincial Exhibition. Mr. Bagg was first choice.

Fred Kitson, New Willshire, was elected 1959 president of the Club. Reg Clark, also of New Willshire, was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

Others named to the Club's new Board of Directors were: Arnold Lord, Bedeque; Fred Coles, New Willshire; Elmer Myers, Hazelbrook; and James Vickerson, North River. Mr. Underhay remains on the new directorate as past president.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT In his annual report Mr. Underhay referred to the passing of Edwin Lord, Bedeque, a prominent Island Jersey breeder for many years. At the time of his death, Mr. Lord was a director of the Club.

The retiring president also called attention to the fine showing made by Albert Boswell of Marshfield at last year's Exhibition. A new breeder, Mr. Boswell won the "premier breeder" trophy in competition with very strong, high priced mainland entries.

Mr. Underhay also offered his personal congratulations to James Vickerson of North River who was recently appointed as Maritime Director for the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club.

Island exhibitors had made a very excellent showing at the Royal Winter Fair, Mr. Underhay observed.

## Would-Be Postage Santa Moves To Receiving End

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)—A Jewish immigrant has graciously surrendered his would-be role of Santa Claus for thousands of Canadians. Now it appears he may become a recipient of Santa Claus himself.

Gustav Wohl, whose mother and other close relatives succumbed to the Nazi terror in Germany, had offered to deposit \$100 at the post office here to pay one-cent deficient postage on Christmas cards going north of the border from Rhode Islanders.

Most senders were unaware that the three-cent stamp is good only on unsealed letters within the United States and had neglected to place the required one-cent postage on their greetings. The post office estimated that up to 10,000 such cards would be mailed here.

While federal postal officials

ceeded between a policy of sending them on regardless—as 2,000 were forwarded up to Wednesday—and destroying all without return addresses, Wohl stepped up. GOT ONLY ONE

He had come to the U.S. 10 years ago, had no relatives here and had received only one Christmas card himself, from a co-worker. He explained his offer this way:

"This was a good opportunity. How often does one get a chance to play Santa Claus at one cent a person."

Wohl was told to come back Thursday. When he showed up on schedule this morning, Postmaster Raymond A. Creegan had "bad news" for him. New orders from the Boston regional office were to send on the remaining Christmas cards despite the postage deficiency. Gustav took it with good grace.

Meanwhile, many persons were calling newspaper offices to get Wohl's home address. They all wanted to send him Christmas cards. One school teacher said she was going to have her whole class mail greetings to him.

Another woman said she wasn't prosperous enough to make the same offer Wohl had made to the post office, but she wanted to show him how she felt. He'll get a Christmas card from her, too.

Gustav, it seemed, has brought the Christmas spirit to all of Rhode Island.

SIX-PERCENT INCREASE

OTTAWA (CP)—Foreign vehicles entering Canada on travellers' vehicle permits totalled 107,764 in November, an increase of six per cent from a year earlier, the bureau of statistics reported today. However, the bureau said the increase was due to a change in procedure at certain New Brunswick ports of entry. Data comparable with last year's would show a decrease of nearly one per cent.
