**Canadian Prosperity Forecast**

C. Ivor Murray, vice-president, research, of Nesbitt, Thompson and Company Limited, has forecast another year of prosperity for Canada.

Mr. Murray, guest speaker at a meeting in Confederation Centre Thursday, forecast an increase in the Canadian gross national product for the year 1965 of 5 1/2 per cent to 6 per cent, of which possibly 1 1/2 per cent to 1 3/4 per cent would be represented by price increases or a net gain of 4 per cent to 4 1/2 per cent.

He said the next five years will bring new problems and tremendous opportunities to Canada, and predicted Canada's labor force would grow at a rate faster than almost any other western country and half again as the United States.

**Maritimers Unwilling To Move Even For Better Atlantic Area Jobs**

A Halifax personnel placement officer says that Maritimers seeking executive level employment must learn to move to those places in the Atlantic region where such jobs are available, rather than wait for employment to come to them.

Ernest Kerr, president of Atlantic Personnel Placement Limited, says "although attitudes are changing, too many residents of the region seem to prefer taking low-paying jobs in their home communities to improving their income through a move — even to another locale within their own province."

"In fact, I have noticed a remarkable number of cases where even a proffered income increase of from \$2,000 - \$3,000 per year has not been enough to induce potentially able executive aspirants to try their wings elsewhere in the Maritimes."

According to Mr. Kerr, this attitude is peculiar to the four Atlantic provinces. "Throughout the rest of Canada," he notes, "a constant state of flux exists at the executive level in business as both men and corporations seek the best working combinations. This inevitably results in more efficient business practices and improved pay and work conditions for the capable employee."

**BUSINESS PROSPERS**

He stresses that, "where men are willing to seek a change, to try something new, and to improve their earning power, business prospers — and when business prospers, the community as a whole benefits."

Mr. Kerr adds that when Maritimers do make a move for employment purposes, they tend to fix their attention on Quebec and Ontario, "thus lending unwarranted credence to the myth that the grass is greener on the other side of the Upper Canada fence."

"Taken on a per capita basis," he says, "executive opportunities in the Maritimes compare very favorably with those in Canada's larger metropolitan centres."

"Our average income placements run between \$7,000 and \$9,000 per year. As starting wages, these figures tend to prove that the potential for executive employment and advancement in the area is not as limited as some might think."

**REVISE THINKING**

The surge towards industrialization in the Atlantic provinces will, Mr. Kerr believes, force Maritimers to revise their thinking.

"Companies investing large sums of money here are seeking men who show promise in the executive field and who are aware of local conditions. If they experience difficulty in this
