British Foursome Leading Tourney

ROME (AP) — A British foursome held onto the lead in the fourth World Amateur Golf Team championship by one stroke Thursday after the second 18 holes of play in the 72-hole tournament.

The defending U.S. team moved up to second place from sixth. New Zealand was third, Italy fourth and Canada fifth.

The British quartet turned in a three-man total of 231 which added to their 214 score Wednesday for a total of 445, the worst of each team's four scores each day is discarded.

The U.S. foursome, which posted a three-man score of 221 Wednesday, turned in a 228 for a total of 446.

New Zealand's team scored 223 today for a 448 total and Italy's 231 for 449.

CANADIAN SCORES

Canada has a two-day total of 451, scoring 227 today and 224 Wednesday.

Heavy Court Session Held At Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — A Charlottetown man, Gordon Reid Miller, was fined \$75 and costs when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday on a charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired.

On a similar charge, Joseph Aoyinas Arsenault, 31, of 745 St. Mary's, N.B., was also fined \$75 and costs.

Two Sydney, N.S., youths who, at an earlier hearing had pled guilty to being in possession of stolen goods, were each fined \$50 and costs or 30 days.

The youths, John Joseph Prentice and Patrick Joseph Boudreau, who travelled to P.E.I. to pick potatoes, were given until Oct. 29 to pay the fine.

Sidney Stewart of Wood Islands entered a plea of guilty to a charge of impaired driving but pleaded not guilty to a second charge of obstructing a police officer. Magistrate MacDonald adjourned both cases to Nov. 20, the impaired driving charge for sentencing and the obstruction charge for a date to be set.

For operating a vehicle not properly licensed, Donald Henry Hutchinson, North Berwick, was fined \$10 and costs.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says skies were overcast throughout Nova Scotia, Eastern Prince Edward Island and the southern fringes of New Brunswick late Thursday.

The end of the series of Atlantic disturbances, causing rain for several days over eastern sections of the district, is in sight. The clear and dry air, now over New Brunswick, is moving slowly and steadily eastward, but it will be later in the day before most of Nova Scotia will have cleared out.

Another disturbance, now located over Central Great Lakes, will spread cloud over New Brunswick today and rain is expected to reach northern New Brunswick by evening.

The outlook for Saturday is for showery weather in all three provinces.

South Shore, Annapolis Valley, Northern Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island: Clear and cool; light winds. Low-high at Yarmouth 45 and 53, Kentville and New Glasgow 42 and 53, Charlottetown 45 and 53.

Gangplank Incident Gets Official Report

ON BOARD HMCS NIPIGON (CP) — The Queen sailed toward Quebec Thursday night after a quiet day at sea aboard the royal yacht Britannia.

But there was an official statement on an earlier incident — the g.n.g. plank that slipped in Charlottetown Wednesday night.

The Britannia's statement said the gangplank slipped off a landing platform at the pier in Charlottetown. It delayed the Queen's embarkation on board.

The Queen was about to board Britannia at the end of her three-day visit to Prince Edward Island when the gangplank slipped.

She took the near miss with a bright smile, but a Royal Naval spokesman in London said the matter would be investigated.

Britannia's statement, issued as the ship and her four Canadian naval escorts neared the Gaspé coast, said:

WAS SLIGHT MOVEMENT

"When normal preparations were being made for departure just prior to her majesty's return on board, a slight movement of the ship due to the end of the brow brought the end of the brow (gangplank) to the edge of the platform on which it rested.

"Normal traffic on the brow was stopped until the ship was breasted in again, but before the brow slipped off the platform. The brow was immediately replaced by men from on board assisted by those ashore and Her Majesty's embarkation was delayed about 15 minutes.

The P.E.I. government travel bureau said the year of celebrations has been worth incalculable millions of dollars in publicity for the tourist industry.
