Very Like a Job.

The job of making a new boiler for the Law Courts building in this city has been given to Messrs. Archibald White & Son, who are not boiler makers, but who are very good Grits; and the work will be done not by our own workmen here, but by some firm in Nova Scotia. It appears that boilers were not called by public advertisement in the newspapers, but that private letters were sent to Messrs. White—who are, as already stated, not boiler makers—and to Messrs. McKinnon & McLean, who are makers of the best boilers in the Maritime Provinces. We hear that it is a rather more than suspected that the job was practically in the hands of Messrs. White & Sons before the letter was sent out, and that it was well understood that these supporters of the Government were to get the job in any case, means being adopted to secure to them a good profit as a consideration for keeping it away from Messrs. McKinnon & McLean, who are Conservatives. However this may be, the tender of Messrs. White & Son was a trifle the lowest, the consequence being that our local workmen are to be deprived of the employment they would have obtained if the work had been done here, and the community will lose the advantage of the circulation of the money paid as wages for it. Surely this is carrying party spite a little too far. Our shrewdest business men, of both parties, send their orders for boilers to Messrs. McKinnon & McLean. The Government might also have done so under the circumstances, and no fault could have been found with them if they had made a good, clear and definite bargain. At any rate, it was farcical on their part to ask for tenders from men who are not boiler-makers. We hear that the specification for the work was not at all definite, and that the contractors who have been favored, at the expense of our local artisans, will have abundant opportunity to line their pockets by means of "extras." Altogether, the case smells of jobbery, and ought to be carefully investigated when the Legislature meets.

Serious Floods.

MADRID, Sept. 11. Serious floods and storms are reported from Spain—stopping railway communication.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Sept. 12.—Quebec—Codfishing reported good at Long Point and Grand River, fair at Seven Islands, Moisie reported good fares.

New Brunswick—Mackerel fair at Point Escuminac, but no cod. P. E. Island—Mackerel scarce at Miminigash and Alberton, but still taking hooks fairly at Tignish, Kildare and Georgetown. Hake and caplin also plentiful at Georgetown.

Cape Breton—Herring fishery fair at Arichat, but all fisheries very dull elsewhere. Nova Scotia—Herring reported very plentiful at Lunenburg and Port Medway. Mackerel reported schooling and codfishing good off Lunenburg.

Bait squid very plentiful at Perce and Grand River, Que.

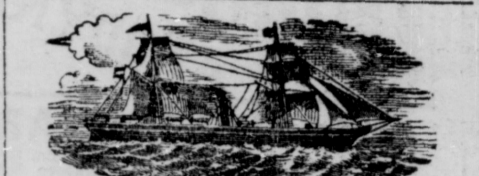
