"THE PATRIOT" AND THE GOVERNOR

From the party point of view, little remains to be added to the letter of Dr. Jenkins, which appears in another column. That the Patriot's apology for Lieutenant Governor McIntyre is so weak that it had better not have been written or published everyone will admit. Before the authorities can take notice of the charges against the Lieutenant Governor, they must, of course, be formulated. Still we cannot help thinking that the Lieutenant Governor would have consulted his interest, and not lowered his dignity, if he had by word or act, or both, given the lie to the numerous reports that are prevalent concerning his alleged sympathy with the Boers. A handsome subscription to the South African Fund would have been an effectual answer to those who persist in saying that His Honour has lately given expression to sentiments other than those of a loyal British gentleman and the representative of the Queen in this Province. Or such active interest in the British cause as Lord Minto and Lady Minto have displayed upon every opportunity, would be a fitting expression of sentiment and feeling upon the part of the inmates of our Government House. In ordinary times, a British man might, perhaps, in this free country, afford to bear the stigma of disloyalty to the cause of the Empire. But not now. Lieutenant-Governor McIntyre ought not, at this juncture, in our opinion, to permit the breath of an imputation against his honor and his loyalty. We hope that the charges publicly made by the Summerside Journal will be publicly met.

—A public meeting to discuss civic affairs has been suggested and will, probably, be held some time before the civic election.

THE LYCEUM.—The concert in the Lyceum last evening was very successful. The ladies and gentlemen participating in the programme were in the majority of cases old favorites, and it is perhaps needless to say that they all did well. Master Leith Coombs, son of Mr. John Coombs, made his first public appearance, and his recitation and song was cleverly rendered. The concert was exceedingly creditable to the juvenile promoters, Masters Ernest McDonald and Charles Merry. The money realized goes towards the Cathedral fund.

NATURAL HISTORY AND ANTIQUARIAN SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of this Society was held last evening. The report of the transactions of the past year was read by the secretary. "SAVE ME FROM MY FRIENDS"

Must have been the exclamation of Lieut. Governor MacIntyre when he read in The Patriot the supremely ridiculous article intended for his defence against charges which the writer himself alleges have not been made. If any charge should be made it is to be hoped that a more effectual defence will be offered than an absurd reference to a grandfather or a grandmother.

This matter is at present in a very unsatisfactory state. If there is any accusation against the governor, let it be made in a straightforward and manly way. Anonymous insinuations against a gentleman in the position of the Queen's representative are most unbecoming and should be dropped.

The writer in the Patriot goes on to say that "The Conservatives have been noted for their lip loyalty." If this is an insinuation that the Conservatives are not truly loyal I hurl it back in his face as a base falsehood and defy him to the proof.

I should be very sorry to say that the great majority of Liberals are not thoroughly loyal. But I can point to some in high places who cannot be placed in that category, notably the very man whom the Patriot intends to honor and whose sentiments he asks us to listen to.

Does he forget that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the man who refused to send a Canadian Contingent to aid the Mosher Country when the treacherous Boers, taking her at a disadvantage, declared war against her and invaded her territory; that he heartlessly had run off to a junketing at Chicago when he should at least have remained at his post and given the matter the deepest consideration. Returning he found such wave of indignation had passed over the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific, that he dare not desert it, and did that from fear which true loyalty would have impelled him to do with a glow of satisfaction. And now he and his unscrupulous backers prate about his loyalty.

Further,—Does the Patriot forget, or is he not aware, that once upon a time a member stood up in his place in the House of Commons and declared that "he would have shouldered his musket" to shoot down our brave lads who took their lives in their hands, faced innumerable hardships and shed their blood for their Queen and country in the Northwest rebellion? That member's name was Wilfrid Laurier.

If ever there was a man to whom the epithet "lip loyalty" could be justly applied—that man is the present Premier of Canada, and the term, as I understand it, indicates a loyalty that is found in the mouth but has no place in the heart.

Feeling indignant that there should be any imputation on the loyalty of the party to which I belong, I have written warmly calling "a spade a spade" and not admiring the Boer system of firing from behind a kopje. I append my name.
