**TRUMP MANAGEMENT**

Top score in today's deal, played at match-points, went to that South who handled the trump suit properly.

East dealer.  
East-West vulnerable.

Strangely enough, none of the eight North-South pairs reached five diamonds, although that contract was almost a laydown. The perfect fit of the hands was hard to visualize. This was a typical bidding sequence:

Fast South West North  
1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 ♠  
Pass Pass 3 ♠  
Pass Pass Pass

The opening lead varied; some Wests laid down the club ace; others led a trump, but this was of small consequence. Every declarer except one drew trumps as quickly as possible, cashed the spade ace and finessed to the spade jack, then discarded a heart on the spade king. However, with a spade and four hearts left in dummy, and with only three trumps still in the closed hand, two tricks then had to be conceded.

Only one South took the proper view about trumps. He won West's diamond jack opening with the queen, led to the spade ace, and immediately finessed against the spade queen, leaving the diamond ten at large. Now he cashed the spade king, discarding a heart, and led a heart from dummy. East could not be greatly blamed for going in with the king, and after that declarer could cross-ruff the hand completely, making six-odd.

The other declarers obviously feared that the missing trump was in East's hand, and that East might ruff the third round of spades. They overlooked, however, that even if this happened, South would still make as many as he could make by drawing the outstanding trump.
