ARTILLERY ASSOCIATION.—It has been decided to hold the Dominion artillery competitions at Point Pleasant, near Halifax, on the military range. The competitions take place during the first and second weeks of August, and the artillerymen taking part will go under canvas near the old park.

QUICK PASSAGE.—The steamer Olivette, of the Canada Atlantic Line, made her last trip to Boston in 25 hours. The magnificent steamers Halifax and Olivette, forming a tri-weekly service to Boston, are carrying a large number of passengers, sailing from Halifax every Tuesday and Thursday at 8 a. m., and Saturday at 10 p. m.

ST. JOHN'S FIRE.

The Roman Catholic Cathedral Not Burned.

The Estimated Loss. MEN AND CHILDREN BURNED

St. John's, Nfld., July 11. No pen can describe the appalling nature of the destruction and utter ruin which has overwhelmed the people of this city. Some 2,500 houses, public buildings, churches and business establishments have been cremated, with all their contents, and 14,000 people have been rendered homeless, of whom over 5,000 are absolutely destitute. The Roman Catholic cathedral has escaped. The scene during the fire was terribly grand, but is now terrifying in the desolation that remains. Thousands of people who were in comfortable circumstances are penniless and helpless to-day. Their houses, food, clothes and everything else was burned up before their eyes, and they barely escaped with their lives. Not only has there been an appalling destruction of property, the most terrible since the great Chicago conflagration, but there was also deplorable loss of life. Two little children were burned to death, and five men were either cremated or drowned. By the burning of the steamer Alert, the brig Dover, and Harvey's coal hulk at the wharves it is feared that many other lives were lost which have not been reported. A man named Lindsay dropped dead from fright during the fire, and a woman who fled for refuge to the open fields gave birth to a child. The total loss is roughly estimated at \$15,000,000 and the insurance at \$6,000,000. The homeless people are now camped in open fields under such rough temporary shelter as could be improvised.

LATER. St. John's, Nfld., July 11. The burned district includes the following streets running east and west: Water St., Duckworth St., Goswami St., and south side of Military Road; Queen's Road, which runs north-east from Church Hill to Rawling's Cross; Long's Hill, which runs south-east from the Parade Ground to the Episcopal cathedral (where the fire originated), Cathedral Street and Market Hill, which runs to the water side. Limekiln Road, which runs from the Parade Ground southwest to Beck's Cove, forms the western boundary of the fire. Within the burned district, running north from the water, are Church Hill, Prescott Street, King's Road, Cochran Street, besides other streets.

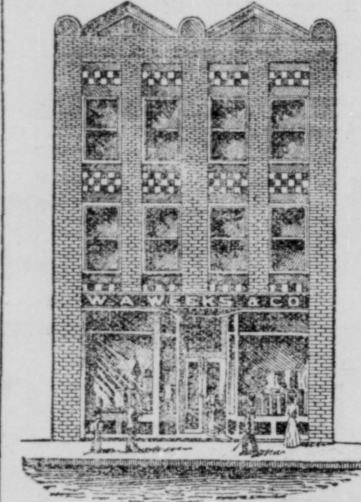
