Rev. John Goodwill is preaching here once a month to a very large and appreciative audience, and his able sermons are bringing forth fruit to salvation.

The roads in this section of the country are in a very bad condition. A certain Supervisor is making himself busy, with the idea that he is repairing them, by throwing on loose earth. In our opinion it is throwing away money for nothing, as after the repairing they are almost impassable. It must be for his own interest and not for the public that so much money is thrown away.

The country around here is flooded with travelling agents, squeezing the farmers into purchasing certain articles of which they have no absolute need. Let the farmers beware of such men.

We have great satisfaction with our mail carrier. He is the right man in the right place.

Shipping has been good in this port. McLean & Co. have lowered the price of potatoes from 25 to 20 cents. The farmers are not satisfied.

John Aorn, Currie & Co. are doing a large business in the rabbit and meat canning. Success to them in their new enterprise.

We are glad to see the firm of Newbery & Morrison enlarging their business, with Edmund Clay as their foreman.

A Turner, of Upton, has done a large business in trout fishing the past summer. He has shipped a large quantity to the firm of Myrick & Co. Success to the enterprise.

Times are somewhat brisk around, although prices for farm produce are very low.

Gus Clay has introduced blue regalia into the Upton Lodge, an idea which he has taken from Haverhill, Mass.

Clay's Bridge is approaching completion. Next spring it will be down stream. No Tory need apply. "Oh, consistency thou art a jewel!"

The Real Position.

(Montreal Gazette.)
The speeches which Hon Mr. Foster has been making in England, and he has addressed many important gatherings, will tend to clear up any misconceptions that may prevail there as to the condition of the commerce and finances of the Dominion. At no former period in the history of Canada has its foreign trade attained as large dimensions in volume and value as during the current year, while the substantial prosperity of domestic commerce is attested by the high point at which the bank circulation is maintained. By whatever test critics may choose to apply, the condition of the people will be found to be satisfactory. Railway traffic steadily augment, the export and import of goods increases, deposits in the banks are amounting up at a rapid rate, the business of the postal service expands from month to month, wages are steady and employment not difficult to obtain. Moreover, the agricultural class, the prime producers of the country, are finding new markets for farm stuffs, and are receiving for the products of their labor, with few exceptions, prices which leave little or no room for complaint. In the three months of the current fiscal year to September 30, the value of goods exported from the Dominion was \$39,794,075, as against an import of \$34,017,012 in the corresponding period of the preceding year, which, in turn, showed a substantial gain over 1890. The increase amounts to no less than 16 per cent.

In this connection we have valuable testimony from a gentleman thoroughly qualified to form an accurate opinion on the condition of the general trade of the Dominion, Mr. George Hague, the general manager of the Merchants' Bank, whose sources of information are wide and reliable. Having been requested by the correspondent of the London Standard to state his opinion as to the correctness of the remark attributed to Sir John Lubbock, in an address before the London Chamber of Commerce, that "Canada's export trade was in a condition of commercial paralysis," Mr. Hague writes:

"At the very time when Sir John Lubbock is speaking about our export trade being paralysed, we are, ourselves, handling a far larger amount of foreign bills, based on Canadian exports, than we did last year, and from all I hear the other banks are doing so likewise. The circulation returns of our banks show an extraordinary activity in the matters of purchases of exportable articles, all which tend to confirm the accuracy of the Customs House returns of exports as given in official statements. Sir John Lubbock probably fancies that the McKinley bill has paralyzed us. He evidently does not know, though he should if he speaks at all on the subject, that the only effect the bill has had is to divert many of our former exports to the United States in the direction of Europe. This bill has for some time past been casting bills on England, drawn against exports of other articles for which we formerly carried bills on the States."

Such testimony, from so high an authority, is of the greatest value. Canada is not, as some critics would have people believe, in a state of commercial prostration. On the contrary, in nearly every department of trade the movement is active and constantly growing.

Personal.
Senator Jones, one of the American delegates to the forthcoming monetary conference, who is at present in England, says that the Democrats are bound to introduce a free coinage bill into Congress.

Edward Blake is working to reconcile the McCarthy and Parnell factions and is hopeful of ultimate success. It is stated that some of the Parnellite leaders are willing to join hands with the opposition under his leadership.

The Irish Times contains an article in reference to the bankruptcy of the widow of Charles Stewart Parnell. Mrs. Parnell has been driven into insolvency. Mr. Parnell was poor when he died, and there was not enough money in his household to bury him. John Redmond, Pierce Mahony, then M. P. for North Meath, and Timothy Harrington defrayed by their personal contributions the cost of the funeral. Mr. Parnell had expended \$250,000 in freeing the estate at Avondale from mortgages and the trustees attempt to make the mines on the estate profitable. This left Mrs. Parnell with no other resource but a small annuity under the will of her deceased aunt, Miss Wood, of Eltnam. Mrs. Parnell has left Brighton, being unable to sustain the cost of living there, and has taken up her residence at Redhill.

It will be remembered that under the old Department of Marine and Fisheries the late Mr. W. F. Whitcher held the opposition of commissioner of fisheries. On his superannuation some eight or ten years ago the position was filled, and when the department was divided into the Department of Marine and the Department of Fisheries, the deputy of the latter department practically took the place of the commissioner. Now that the departments have been again united it is felt that a revival of the position of commissioner of fisheries would be advantageous, and it is understood that the services of Professor Prince, of St. Mungo College, Glasgow, have been secured in this connection. The professor has made the subject of fisheries a study and has had a great deal of experience on the Fisheries board in Scotland. He will probably leave for Canada shortly.

The latest indignity offered the Jews by the Russian government was at Moscow, raised, trained and first distinguished as an educator in the Dominion.

The population of the Indian Empire has risen within the memory of the present generation from 220,000,000 to 289,000,000. It has been increasing at the rate of 3,000,000. If no large famines occur it will considerably exceed 300,000,000 at the end of the century now drawing to a close. Even causes were with an excess over the 300,000,000. This augmentation is coincident with a growth in means and resources of livelihood and in material prosperity of all kinds. The exportation of food grains in vast quantities continues. The average of population in the Indian empire is very moderate.
