Egmont Bay, Mont Carmel Fair Opened By Premier

The 1955 Egmont Bay and Mont Carmel exhibition was officially opened yesterday afternoon by Premier A. W. Matheson who expressed the hope that this year's exhibition would be a most successful one. He said that all those who were connected with this great annual show were deserving of credit that they are doing a great job. He said that while the weather was not all that could be desired, the officials should not be discouraged but look forward to a better day next year. Marred by cold winds and scattered showers throughout the day, the exhibition was, nevertheless, fairly well attended and in most cases the exhibits were, in the opinion of the judges, up to the usual standard.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, in his remarks said that the idea of an exhibition was to improve the quality of the products produced in the community and that if it does not do so then it is of no benefit. It was a matter of great encouragement to a young man to bring a product to the exhibition and carry home a red ribbon.

WORD FOR FISHERIES
The hope that a display of the products connected with the fishing industry would be included in the shows of the future at Mont Carmel—Egmont Bay was expressed by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, the parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries. Mr. MacNaught said that he noted there were many present from the community who derived their livelihood from fishing and if in future their products were demonstrated

at the exhibition he felt that the results would be most beneficial. Both the Hon. Mr. Matheson and Mr. MacNaught suggested that the directors give consideration to the idea of holding their exhibition earlier in order to take advantage of more ideal weather.

A review of the various classifications of exhibits yesterday showed that the number this year was considerably lower than other years. The sheep exhibit, however, did show well filled classes. Exhibits of sheep have always been outstanding at this show.

Commenting on the placings Mr. Robert Samson of Moncton who did the judging said that the Oxford and Shropshire classes were outstanding. The top group he said (Continued on page 15, col. 3)

Granddaughter Of Prime Minister Weds Saturday

QUEBEC (CP)—Vivacious Louise Samson, 21-year-old granddaughter of Prime Minister St. Laurent, will be married Saturday to a young Quebec lawyer. To one wedding guest, at least, it may seem as if time has been turned back 24 years. It was on Oct. 1, 1931 that Mr. St. Laurent gave away his daughter Marthe in marriage to Dr. Mathieu Samson, then a fledgling practitioner. Saturday, the eldest child of that union will be married. Louise, a pert, shapely brunette, wants the wedding to be given as little publicity as possible. But "Grand-Papa" will be there and already some 20 Quebec policemen have been assigned to keep things rolling smoothly near the Church of Notre Dame du Chemin in uptown. LIVE IN NORANDA The groom-elect is Yvan Mignault, a 25-year-old law graduate of Laval University. After the marriage he will set up practice in Noranda, Que., where the couple plans to buy a house. "We had planned to start out in an apartment but my grandmother (Mrs. St. Laurent) told us we should get a house and settle down," Louise said in an interview. "So we followed her advice." "She is going to give us a nice present too, but like our honeymoon plans, it's a secret." The couple met at a students' party in Quebec Coliseum when Louise was 17. She was taking a domestic science course at Laval. She received her engagement ring last month and the wedding was originally scheduled for next June. But when Mignault decided to go to Noranda, plans were rushed for the October date. ALMOST 200 GUESTS Louise said some people have asked whether her grandfather will give her away. "It's Daddy who will do that," she said. "He (Prime Minister St. Laurent) won't be there as prime minister, he'll be there as grandfather... of course that's pretty important too." Louise's interests lie mainly in dancing and the theatre, but because of her close association with the St. Laurent family she is also well-versed in world affairs. She accompanied Mr. St. Laurent on election campaigns in 1949 and 1953. Only close friends of both families have been invited to the wedding but the guest list runs to almost 200. Rev. Eugene-Henri Levesque, superior of the Dominican monastery at nearby Montmorency and former dean of social sciences at Laval University, will officiate.

Rush Anti-Typhoid Serum To Barbadoes

TORONTO. (CP)—The Canadian Red Cross society announced anti-typhoid serum from Canada was flown to Barbadoes Wednesday to avert a threatened epidemic. An urgent call for serum was received from the director of medical services of the island a colony in the British West Indies battered this week by a hurricane. The shipment, 10,000 cubic centimetres, was prepared by Connaught Medical Laboratories at the University of Toronto and purchased by the society.

OTTAWA. (CP)—Former premier John B. McNair of New Brunswick today was appointed chief justice of New Brunswick and head of the N. B. Appeal Court. Justice Minister Garson announced that the former Liberal party leader, who headed the N. B. government from 1940 to 1952, succeeds Chief Justice Charles D. Richards, who is retiring. S'side Meeting Asks For Egg, Poultry Field Man

That the P. E. I. Egg Station Operators Poultry Products Improvement Association recommend to the Provincial Department of Agriculture that an egg and poultry field man be appointed to assist in the improvement of the quality of eggs, was unanimously passed at the association's semi-annual meeting held last evening at Howard's Restaurant, Summerside East. Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries and Hon. Eugene Cullen, provincial Minister of Agriculture were present at the largely attended meeting presided over by the president, Mr. Urban McQuaid, Charlottetown. A lengthy discussion centered around the problems of egg quality improvement and marketing and many suggestions were put forth including the appointment of extra inspectors and/or more frequent inspections; educating the producers in the raising and marketing of eggs through proper feeding and care, and the appointment of a field man on which a motion was passed that a recommendation to this effect be made immediately to the Department of Agriculture. The discussion revealed that there is not sufficient uniformity in egg grading and consequently many producers are taking their product to the less strict grading stations where their eggs are graded higher. UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi Wednesday challenged the right of any country to tell his government where and how it should buy arms for its defence. In a statement issued at the UN, he said: "It is our indisputable right and our inescapable duty to get from wherever we can our defence requirements."

SAN FRANCISCO. (AP)—A childless housewife who "just had to have a baby" remorsefully surrendered Robert Maric, early Wednesday nine days after the newborn boy was kidnaped in San Francisco. Recovery of the healthy baby, now 11 days old, ended a country-wide hunt.

Even Out Wealth

Broadly speaking the federal objectives are to distribute Canada's wealth more evenly among the rich and poor provinces at the same time safeguard federal revenues to finance federal obligations under the constitution. "We can achieve the objectives without limiting the provinces' taxing powers, the prime minister added. But it may be said, that the provinces may prefer some kind of agreement. Officials have said that under the new plan being considered, the central administration would allow the provinces to get a share of direct taxes.

Offer Guarantee

It would offer the provinces an exchange: A guarantee of minimum revenues and federal tax-collecting machinery in return for provincial agreements to keep their tax rates uniform and limit yields to, say, 10 per cent of federal income tax revenue, seven or eight per cent of federal corporation income collections and 50 per cent of federal succession duties. The federal government then would reduce its levies by a similar amount to prevent an increase in payments by Canadian taxpayers.

Prime Minister Gives Opinion After Meeting

OTTAWA. (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent said Wednesday federal tax objectives can be achieved without tax rental agreements with the provinces.

This statement made to reporters following a day-long cabinet session appeared to be in line with reports that the government is considering scrapping the tax pacts and allowing the provinces to get back into the direct taxing field.

The cabinet is believed to have gone over the plan as mapped out by its advisers and accepted many of its general ideas. Discussion of details will continue today. Mr. St. Laurent said the cabinet will go back into session in the morning after two sessions Wednesday.

Premier Leaves For Ottawa

Attending the Conference with the Premier will be Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, Provincial Secretary and Treasurer, Hon. Keir Clark, Minister of Education, Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, Mr. W. E. Massey, Deputy Provincial Secretary and Mr. William Hughes. The Premier expressed satisfaction that the report that the Birds Eye Foods (Canada) Limited had been purchased by National Sea Products of Halifax. He said that since the new owners were chiefly a fish processing organization, there is every indication that the Island will benefit sooner under the change of hands.

Town Wrecked By Hurricane

MIAMI. (AP)—Uncounted dead and injured were reported Wednesday from the flattened tiny seaport of Xcalak as killer Hurricane Janet slashed across Mexico's Yucatan peninsula and moved back over open water still carrying winds of 100 miles an hour.

To Fly Pearson To Moscow

Two RCAF radio operators who will fly the Hon. Lester B. Pearson to Moscow on 30th September, check their radio equipment before setting out on the 25,000 mile, six week flight. Standing in for D. Henry, Montreal, watching F/O Doug Bentley of Charlottetown, P.E.I., check radio facilities on the route. When the C5 aircraft lands in Moscow it will mark the first time that an RCAF aircraft has visited Russia in over ten years. The flight will visit such large centres as: Paris, Brussels, Berlin, Moscow, Stalingrad, Leningrad, Singapore, Calcutta and Colombo. F/O Bentley who joined the RCAF in 1951 had previously served as a radio officer with the Department of Transport. Since joining 412 squadron he has flown thousands of miles both overseas and in North America. Like the other crew members he is eagerly awaiting the opportunity to visit Russia, one of the few countries he has not already seen. As radio officer he will be responsible for all radio communications between the aircraft and the various flight centres in the more than ten countries the aircraft will fly over.

Defence Dept. Concerned By Aircraft Plant Strike

OTTAWA. (CP)—Defence officials Wednesday voiced concern over the Wednesday strike at de Havilland Aircraft Co., at Toronto. The first of these are to be delivered later this year to replace the Sea Furies.
