

**Mr. Goschen's Mission to Turkey.**

A telegram from Vienna says:—"It is believed here that the special instructions of Mr. Goschen as Ambassador to Constantinople contain the following items: A demand for the enlargement of Montenegrin territory; the cession of Epirus and Thessaly to Greece; the transformation of Macedonia into an autonomous province like Roumelia; a real reform in Armenia, putting an end to all oppression of Christians. In giving these instructions, Lord Granville concludes with a hope that neither Austria nor Germany will oppose these demands."

**England's Thanks.**

The U. S. Secretary of State has received from the British Minister at Washington a communication in which he states that in compliance with an instruction which he has received by telegraph from Earl Granville, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State, for Foreign Affairs, he has the honor to convey to the Government of the United States the sincere and cordial thanks of Her Majesty's Government for its generous and friendly conduct in having despatched the United States ship Constellation loaded with provisions, which were so much needed for the relief of the distressed subjects of Her Majesty in Ireland, and which besides being a substantial aid to them in their affliction have been accepted by all Her Majesty's subjects as a proof of the friendly feelings entertained toward them by the Government and citizens of the United States.

**Prince Leopold.**

Prince Leopold, whose arrival in Quebec on Sunday we have already announced, although the youngest of the sons of Her Majesty is already beginning to take a larger place in the public eye than any of his brothers, with the single exception of the Prince of Wales. Prince Leopold was born in 1853, and is therefore 27 years of age, but within a year or two his health has not been good and he has lived a retired and studious life. He inherits from his father, the late Prince Consort, a decidedly strong literary taste and is the talented member of the Royal family. Of late he has made a good many public appearances, and as a speaker has proved decidedly successful. He is a skilled musician, but his studies have taken a decidedly philosophical bent than those of either of his Royal brothers. His welcome in Quebec has been a warm one, and all over Canada he will be equally well received. We understand that as yet no particular programme has been arranged of his stay in Canada. No doubt, however, he will visit the principal cities of the Dominion, and it is probable that he will also make an extended tour of the United States.

**Latest News Notes.**

A delegate from Ireland is visiting Manitoba to select a site for an Irish Colony.

There was a great depression on the New York Stock Market on the 25th. At one time a panic was imminent.

Lightning struck a house in Halifax on the 24th. No one was hurt worth mentioning.

Lord Granville has asked the Shah of Persia for explanations concerning insults offered to the British Consul by a Persian official.

It is understood that Prince Leopold is determined to see as much of the country as his time will permit, and in order to do so wishes to avoid unnecessary ceremonial of all descriptions.

Mr. Macdonald, General Superintendent, and Mr. Harrison, Chief Agent of the Money Order System, who visited Ottawa last week, have agreed with the Canadian Postal Authorities upon the terms of a new convention by which the exchange of money orders between the United States and the Dominion of Canada will be the same as the new arrangement with England.

The cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted.

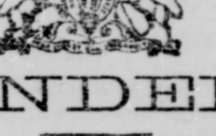
