

## U.I.C. Benefits For Farmers A Necessity, Says Minister

Recalling that William Acorn (Liberal First Kings) and Harvey Douglas (Liberal Second Kings) had introduced the first resolution in the Legislature regarding Unemployment Insurance to Fishermen, Hon. M. L. Bonnell, said Monday the time had now come when a similar resolution was in order on behalf of farmers.

The Minister of Health said the resolution sponsored by the two Kings members had received the hearty support of the House and it was forwarded on to Ottawa and no doubt was a big factor in the Federal Government's making up their mind to institute insurance for fishermen which has proven such a great boon to the Island.

Dr. Bonnell said the Federation of Agriculture might not agree, but he was insistent that farmers were being put to great disadvantage by not having the benefits of the act extended to them.

He said a farmer was obliged to pay a worker \$4.00 a day for six hours work and give two meals. At the same time such a worker, he said would quickly leave the farmer and work in a factory for \$3.00 a day, simply because he could get unemployment stamps in his book.

Dr. Bonnell felt that not only should the benefits be made available to farm labor but to the farmer himself. In the case of the fisherman, he said, he receives unemployment insurance while he is building traps or packing ballast while the farmer on the other hand feeds his stock or grades his potatoes during the winter. He felt there was a parallel in each case and further investigation should be made in the matter.

It was decided to have a social evening in Northern Hall on Mar-

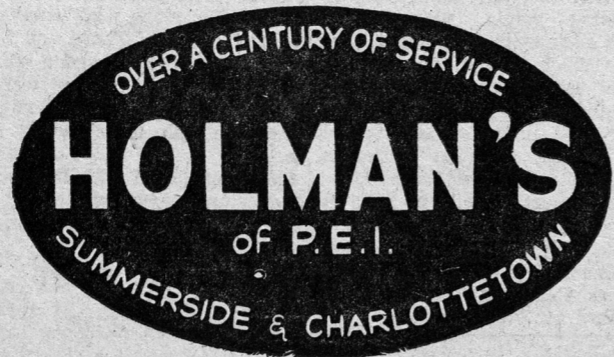
