

Death Penalty Commutation Is Held Likely To Continue

VANCOUVER (CP) — The president of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police said Tuesday the recent commutation of a death sentence indicates "there will be no immediate change in the thinking of the cabinet" despite a parliamentary vote to retain the death penalty.

"I believe the public is entitled to know why the cabinet has chosen to commute death sentences," said Chief James P. Mackey of Metropolitan Toronto Police.

He referred in a speech at the association's annual convention here to the recent commutation of the death sentence of Roger Fulton, convicted of the murder of a loan company manager during a holdup.

Fulton was to be hanged early last month, but the cabinet commuted the sentence because "new neurological evidence had been introduced," said Chief Mackey.

"There is a natural tendency to sympathize with a person who has run afoul of the law, but for some reason, society in general, and particularly the individual who is the victim, is quickly forgotten."

"The citizens of this country look to their representatives in Parliament to fulfill their obligations in protecting them," he said. "Surely this responsibility is not too onerous for the cabinet."

Chief Mackey said that all murderers should not necessarily be executed, "but very definitely there are cases which are planned and vicious crimes and must be resolved by capital punishment."

One-Time Amateur Wrestler Opposes Smallwood In Vote

CORNER BROOK, Nfld. (CP) — Calvin G. Normore, 49, a former amateur wrestler, is billed for his biggest bout—a tussle with Premier Joseph Smallwood, 65, in Thursday's provincial election.

And unless Mr. Smallwood drastically changes the style that has kept him at the head of the Newfoundland Liberal government for 17 years, Mr. Normore is in for a heck of a fight in the west coast district of Humber West.

Tubby Normore (he picked up the nickname in his younger wrestling days) was named leader of the New Democratic Party only three days after the election was called. He has no political background.

Mr. Smallwood left his safe Bonavista North riding to run in Humber West, which includes

about half this city of 30,000. No Progressive Conservative candidate will oppose them.

The premier left his home district only once before. That was in 1959 when he contested St. John's West and took the seat away from Progressive Conservative leader Malcolm Holt, later named to the Senate.

Observers here feel Mr. Smallwood is out to kill two birds with one stone. By contesting Humber West he can also campaign for Liberal newcomer Clyde Wells in the adjacent Humber East district, now held by the PC leader, Dr. Noel Murphy.

The Liberal vote in the two Humber districts has been dropping since the woodsman's strike of 1959 when Premier Smallwood decried the International Woodworkers of America to get the men back to work.

In the last election, Ed Finn Jr., a Corner Brook newspaper columnist, ran for the NDP and all but took Humber West from veteran Charlie Ballam, recently retired Liberal-labor minister.

Mr. Ballam's 1959 majority dropped from 1,325 to 240 in 1962.

Also in the last election, Liberal incumbent Jack Forsay lost to Dr. Murphy by 366 votes in Humber East.

There are 10,000 voters in Humber West, 1,000 more than four years ago.

Mr. Normore, a machinist at the Bowater paper mill here and western representative of the Newfoundland Federation of Labor, says he will fight the premier "with every means at my disposal."

"I'm fighting to win," said the Second World War veteran. "It would be interesting to see how the premier would take defeat."

If Mr. Normore wins, it would be the first victory for an NDP candidate in the province.

He says the party didn't have time to organize properly for the election and only two other NDP candidates are contesting the 42 seats.

Sukarno Says He's Marxist

JAKARTA (Reuters) — Indonesian President Sukarno said Tuesday he is a Marxist and accused the United States Central Intelligence Agency of plotting to destroy him.

"In some places now there are snipers to kill Sukarno," he declared in a speech here.

He said he has proof that international imperialism is trying to destroy Indonesia and Sukarno, and that the CIA is involved in the plot.

Addressing members of a popular organization called the 1945 Generation, who included many of his old associates in the days before independence, he warned them not to be trapped by the CIA.

He said he has received a letter from British philosopher Bertrand Russell warning him to be more vigilant and stating

that the CIA has expanded its budget five times to intensify its activities.

The president's acknowledgment of his Marxist beliefs came earlier Tuesday when he spoke at his Jakarta palace.

Army leader Gen Suharto, meanwhile, told parliament that Indonesia ended its confrontation of Malaysia because weakened by last October's Communist revolt, it could not hope for a physical victory.

Suharto, the effective leader of Indonesia, blamed the policies of ousted pro-Communist foreign minister Subandrio, now under military arrest, for isolating Indonesia especially in the economic field.
