THE work of removing the hull of the ship *Emigrant* from its dangerous position on the edge of the Hillsborough channel has been energetically prosecuted since Saturday last. Thirteen men and a diver are engaged at the work. The greater portion of the hull has been removed and it is the intention of the contractor to tow off the remainder this evening.

CAPT. YATES, of the brig, "Harry Davies," which arrived in this port from London, G. B., to-day, reports that on the 26th of August, William Pine, second mate, was standing on the house aft when he was struck by the main boom and knocked overboard. Planks and casks were immediately thrown over, and every effort made to save poor Pine; but as a heavy gale was in progress at the time, and the vessel was driving so rapidly before it, that this was found to be impossible. Pine was a capital swimmer, and for a few minutes could plainly be discerned swimming breast high out of the waves, in the wake of the vessel, but at length disappeared; and it is thought that he fell a victim to a shark, as very shortly after the occurrence two immense sharks sailed right up to the side of the vessel. The first mate, who was also on the top of the house at the time, had a very narrow escape, as he too was struck by the boom, but managed to lay hold of the gaff as he was going overboard, and thus saved himself from a terrible death.
