THE brigantine "Harry Davies," Yates, from Demerara for London, had completed repairs and reloaded cargo at Bermuda, June 12, and sailed next day for destination.

In the vicinity of St. John, on Thursday, Mrs. McGowan and her daughter were thrown from a wagon, and received injuries that will probably terminate fatally.

THE clothing for the Charlottetown Engineers Co. arrived to-day in the Miramichi from Quebec. The company meets for drill on Monday evening at 7 o'clock.

THE steamer Miramichi arrived from Montreal and Quebec this morning, with a full cargo of general merchandize and flour. She will sail for Pictou this evening.

THOSE who attended the excursion to New Glasgow on Thursday returned home yesterday evening, well pleased with their trip and delighted with the sights they saw.

HANLAN sails for Canada on the first of July (Dominion Day) by the Inman Line steamer "City of Chester." He will visit Manchester on June 27th and 28th.

IN the Base-Ball match at the St. Patrick's T. A. Society Picnic, on Thursday last, between the Charlottetown (Rocheport Square) Base-Ball Club and a Fort Augustus Club, the Charlottetown boys were the victors by 34 runs.

OUR two juvenile base-ball clubs engaged in a friendly contest on Queen Square, last evening. Quite a crowd of spectators witnessed the game, which would not do discredit to our older boys. The "Hillsborough Club" came off victors.

THE steamer M. A. Starr arrived from Halifax on Thursday morning with a cargo of merchandize. After disloading she reloaded with a cargo consisting of 135 drums of fish, shipped by I. C. Hall; 100 boxes by Carvell Bros.; 200 bush. oats and 3 casks and 1 bbl. by O. Connolly & Co.

THE steamer "Worcester" sailed for Boston on Thursday evening with a cargo consisting of 363 bags and 80 bbls. potatoes, 831 boxes and 18 barrels eggs, 1507 boxes lobsters and the following passengers: Messrs. W. H. Brimmoek, Daniel Callaghan, Miss Ellen M. Lawless, Mrs. M. McIntyre, Mrs. McPhee, J. McDonald, Miss McConnell.

ON Thursday, Jaddis White, a brakeman at Point Duchene, met with a severe accident while working on the shunting engine. He fell between the car and the side of the wharf, and was caught by the truck and dragged a short distance before the engine could be stopped. He had his shoulder blade broken, his thigh put out of joint, and received other injuries. The Times says: "White was formerly a brakeman in the Moncton yard. It was reported here last evening that the man had died, but this is not correct, though the injuries received are very serious. He may not survive."

REV. BENJAMIN CHAPPELL, A. B., who has been in charge of the Lower Cove and Germain street (St. John) Methodist congregations, respectively, has accepted the call recently extended by the Methodist Church, Portland, St. John, and will enter upon his duties as pastor immediately after the ensuing session of Conference which opens here on Wednesday next. The rev. gentleman, who is now only 27 years of age, is a native of this city and well known by our people, to whom it must be gratifying to learn of his popularity in our sister city, and the esteem in which he is held, as is apparent by his recent promotion.

YESTERDAY was the second anniversary of the great fire which destroyed more than half of the city of St. John and turned 15,000 of its people out of doors, leaving many of them without either food, clothing, or means of procuring them. Two years has elapsed since then, and the city has been almost built anew. The Globe of the 19th inst. devotes seven columns of space to a list and partial description of the new buildings erected. From this review we learn that during the past year there has been erected 61 brick buildings, at a cost of \$586,890, and 103 wooden buildings at a cost of \$152,270. In the year ending June 19, 1878, there were erected a total of 352 brick buildings, at a cost of \$3,456,200, and wooden buildings to the number of 536, at a cost of \$739,332. The two years thus give a total of 413 brick and stone buildings at a cost of \$4,023,000, and 639 wooden buildings at a cost of \$891,602. Besides, there have been built in the city, outside the burnt district in 1878-9, buildings valued at \$100,000, and in 1877-8 buildings valued at \$92,000. The estimated total value of the buildings erected in the city during the two years would, therefore, be \$5,106,602.
