INDIANA'S THOUSAND LAKES.

An Extraordinary Group in a Corner of the State and the Big Bass in Them.

"A person might look on the map until he was blind," said W. L. Mott of Richmond, Ind., "without discovering the curious fact that huddled together in the northeastern corner of Indiana are more than 1,000 natural lakes, ranging in size from 10 to 400 acres. They are all within the boundaries of Steuben, De Kalb, Lagrange, Noble and Kosciusko counties, 312 of them being in Noble county. Such is the isolation of this extraordinary group of lakes that the average Indiana citizen, outside the small area in which the system is situated, is unaware of its existence. It is entirely separate from the river system of the state and corresponds in character with that famous group of lakes in Orange and Sullivan counties in New York, and Pike and Wayne counties in Pennsylvania—literally great openings of crystal water, with bottoms of the whitest sand. The wild charm of mountain environment that is characteristic of their eastern counterparts is lacking, however, in the Indiana lakes, although they occupy the highest situation in the state but one.

"Nowhere else in Indiana is there a lake of any size whatever. These sheets of water are the natural homes of the small mouth black bass, and ex-Fish Commissioner Dennis asserts that the small mouth black bass that inhabit the various waters of this country come originally from that group of Indiana lakes. Nowhere else on the continent, except in a small lake near Glens Falls, N. Y., have these fish been caught equal in size to those taken from these Indiana waters. The largest small mouth black bass on record was caught by A. N. Cheney of Glens Falls in the lake I mentioned. It weighed ten pounds. But that fish was an exception to the ordinary run of bass in that lake, while seven, eight and nine pound bass are not uncommon in the Indiana lakes. Sidney Smith of Rome City, Ind., caught a small mouth bass in Sylvan lake that weighed 9½ pounds, and Dr. Moyer of Kendallville killed one that weighed nine pounds in the same lake. Sylvan lake is the largest of these Indiana big springs, its natural size having been enlarged by damming to make it a reservoir in the days of canal navigation. It is five miles long and a mile wide."—New York Sun.

WOMEN IN THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

They Are Infinitely Better Than Men as Teachers of Children.

"The chief and underlying cause of 'The Decay of the Sunday School,' says Edward Bok in 'The Ladies' Home Journal,' is the selection of incapable and incompetent men as superintendents. If men of broader views and keener perceptions were superintendents of our Sunday schools, the necessity for a few changes in the teachers would at once be apparent, and they would be promptly made. One of these changes would be that the masculine element in the active conduct would begin and end with a superintendent, a competent assistant or two and a systematic librarian. The sooner that our churches realize that women, and women alone, should be the teachers of the young in their schools, the nearer they will come to the ideal condition. The more a woman has to do with a child, the better for the child. And the more sympathetic, tender and well bred women and the fewer men we have as teachers in our Sunday schools, the better it will be for the children and the schools.

"But no woman, occupied in business during the week, should, either of her own volition or under pressure, allow herself to be permitted to act as teacher in a Sunday school. When a woman is engaged in business for six days of a week, her Sunday should be to her a day of rest. Her place in church or school on Sunday should be that of auditor, not of worker. A little higher order of intelligence is vitally necessary in our Sunday school classes. We demand this of our teachers in our secular schools and parents have a right to ask it of the Sunday school. It is not enough that the Sunday school teacher should be spiritual; she must have intelligence wherewith to apply her spirituality to the very best advantage and by the most attractive methods.

"Young girls are today teachers who should be in classes. To bring home a spiritual lesson to the mind of a child is not play; it is an art, and calls for experience with children, a knowledge of human nature, an understanding of the very highest and deepest truths of life."

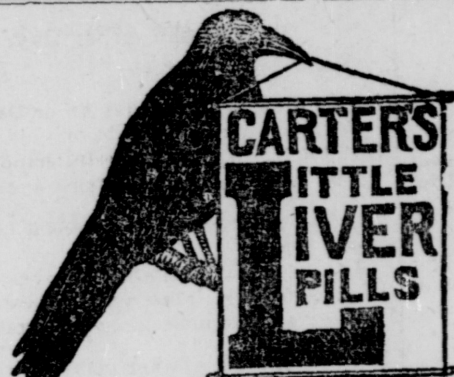
