

Derivation of Woman's Name.

Annabella is to Ann-bella, or fair Anne, but is the feminine of Hannibal, meaning gift (or grace) of Bel. Arabella is not Arabella, or beautiful altar, but O-Abilla, a praying woman. It is Anglicized from Orabel, in its much more common in the thirteenth century than at present. Maurice has nothing to do with Mauritius, or a Moor, but comes from Almaric—himmelreich—the kingdom of heaven. Ellen is the feminine of Alain, Alan or Allan, has no possible connection with Helen, which comes from a different language and is older by a thousand years at least. Amy is not from amce, but from amie. Avic, or Avis, does not exactly mean advice, as some seem to think. It comes from Elwis, and means happy wisdom. Eliza has no connection with Elizabeth. It is the sister of Louisa, and both are the daughters of Heloise, which is Heloise, hidden wisdom. There is, indeed, another form of Louisa, or rather Louise which is the feminine of Louis, but this was scarcely heard of before the sixteenth century. The older Heloise form of the name, Aloisa, Aloisia, or Aloysia, was adopted into medieval English as Alesia—a name which our old genealogists always confuse with Alice. Emily and Amelia are not different forms of one name. Emily is from Emylia, the name of an Etruscan gens Amelio comes from the Gothic amala, heavenly. Reginald is not derived from Regina, and has nothing to do with a queen. It is Rem-ald, exalted purity, Alice, Adelais, Adelaide, Aliza, Alix, Adeline are all forms of one name, the root of which is adel, noble. But Ann was never used as identical with Anna, or Agnes (of which last the old Scottish Annas, is a variety); nor, as I sturdily maintain, was Elizabeth every synonymous with Isabel—Notes and Queries.

The Cost of Cholera.

The cholera epidemic has already cost the continent over four and a half millions of money by the absence of the ordinary summer tourists. Switzerland is the greatest sufferer, as this year her holiday harvest has been almost nil owing to the dread both of infection and of quarantine. Talking of the cholera, it is being pointed out that the Jews in the most affected districts—Marseilles and Toulon—have generally escaped the disease altogether, although they inhabit some of the most crowded and unhealthy parts of the towns. The Jewish Press accordingly ascribe this exemption to the dietary and hygienic regulations prescribed by the Mosaic ritual.

Ruskin and Scott.

An interesting testimony to the strong will and surpassing fortitude of Sir Walter Scott has recently been borne by Mr. Ruskin. In the library of his house at Braithford, where, amidst some of the liveliest scenery in the world, the author of "Modern Painters" tries to forget the existence of utilitarian enterprise and debased art, are the original manuscripts of several of Scott's novels. Among them is "Woodstock," upon which Scott was engaged when the news of his ruin reached him. But there is no trace of disquietude or perturbation in the beautiful clear handwriting. "That," says Mr. Ruskin, "shows how a man can and should bear adversity."

Cattle Disease in Britain.

The effect of the almost total disappearance of cattle disease in Britain is reflected in the returns of imports of meat. In the first eight months of the present year Britain imported £1,248,658 less meat than in the same period last year. The increase of population in the meantime should have demanded a million pounds sterling more meat than in that time in the year 1882, so that the actual loss of trade to the foreign producer was over two million pounds sterling.
