SUPREME COURT—At the Supreme Court Monday Hon. Mr. Johnston concluded his argument in the appeal case of Murphy vs. Waite. Yesterday the three Judges heard arguments in the case of W. M. Simpson and others vs. John S. Cousins. Action for goods sold and delivered tried before the late Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury in January, 1921, when a verdict was given to the defendant.
