

# Can. High School Curling Play For Ch'town In 1958

## Announcement Made Last Night By Curling Committee

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Canadian high school curling committee announced Monday night that the 1958 championship will be played in Charlottetown, P.E.I., and the 1959 championship in Calgary.

A meeting of the committee was held here in conjunction with the playing of the 1957 class.

The committee also decided to recommend to the DCA that New Brunswick be invited to participate in the 1958 championship. At present, it is the only province not in the competition.

Trail, B.C., made a bid in 1954 for the 1958 championship but withdrew it Monday night because officials said they did not have the accommodation necessary at the time.

### Bruins Bidding For Second

Montreal's Habitués, whose team song lately could well have been "Stumbling, Stumble Weeds," came out of a lasting slump Sunday night when they turned back Chicago's hungry Hawks 3-2. Previous to Sunday's encounter, Canadiens were wandering rather aimlessly around N.H.L. cities since January 31 looking for a victory of some sort. They did come close with a tie here and a tie there, but such doings are hardly in keeping with the big year predicted by almost everyone for the Montrealers.

This morning Blake's buccaners are still in second place but not by much, and if certain red, white and blue socks aren't given firmer support in coming weeks, Habs could well find themselves with the job of knocking off Detroit Red Wings in the N.H.L. semi-final playoffs, while Bill Schmidt's Boston beaners are playing a semi-final round with Rangers or Leafs. Naturally, the Bruins would simply love to finish second. Neither the Leafs nor Rangers could dish up anything like the opposition that would be forthcoming from the Red Wings, and as a result, Bruins could find themselves not only making the finals, but having a better than 50-50 chance of winning the Stanley Cup.

We say that Boston would have a good chance of winning the cup simply because the heavy going in a Wings-Canadiens semi-final N.H.L. competition, as a result, Boston—provided of course they could get by their semi-final—should at least be even money in the finals and, in fact, could be given the edge.

Canadians will get a chance to do something about the Detroit lead tonight in a four-point game at Detroit. If they can take the Wings in the home town then it would be fairly safe to surmise the disastrous slump is about over, and a victory will go a long way in silencing the critics who have been heaping most of the blame on the wide shoulders of Jean Beliveau. To Name Beliveau for the Habs' slump, seems to us slightly preposterous. N.H.L. observers have been saying that Beliveau hasn't been pulling his weight in recent games. Admittedly Big Jean hasn't been putting goals or assisting on goals with his usual frequency, but the fact

remains that he is in the top three in the scoring race and, it may be that he is the chief reason Canadians are as high as they are.

The newly formed N.H.L. Players Association with Ted Lindsay as President, has been drawing quite a bit of comment from reporters around the N.H.L. Ted Reeve has this to say: "T. Lindsay of Detroit is the President of the newly formed organization. The National Hockey League Players Protective Association, J. Toppazzini of Boston will undoubtedly be in line for the job of recording secretary."

"The move ... came as a surprise to fans and scribes, who had gathered the idea over the years that hockey players did not agree with each other on any known subject. Or at least when it came in protection it was every man for himself."

"They have a good pension plan in the NHL so it will be interesting to see the line taken now in promoting their best interests. By and large they are a pretty sane bunch of young men, as athletes go, so the move, even if not a vital necessity as of now, should do no harm to anyone in the sport. Just don't give Prez. Lindsay too long a handle on his gavel."

# Island High School Rink Wins Afternoon Match 12-6

WINNIPEG (CP)—Northern Ontario upset defending champion Saskatchewan 8-5 Monday as the Dominion high school curling championships got under way at the Winnipeg Arena.

Second round was scheduled to start at 8 p.m. CST (10 p.m. AST) Monday night.

Other first-round results saw Alberta defeat Manitoba 10-7, Ontario down British Columbia 9-7, Nova Scotia beat Quebec 9-4, and Prince Edward Island defeat New Brunswick 12-6.

Last game to finish, the ding-dong Northern Ontario-Saskatchewan match held the slim crowd right to the finish as the western skip, Ron Paulson, had a chance to tie the count on the final end but was narrow.

Skip Carl Konefal of Port Arthur got his Northern Ontario rink off to a fast start, taking a 4-4 lead after three ends. He was never caught but Paulson came within one point on two ends—the seventh and the ninth.

On the ninth, Paulson had shot rock but was facing six seconds by the opposition when he came to throw his last stone. In a daring attempt to get two, he shot a runner at the secondshot but hit a guard.

Coming home one down, he was narrow on his final stone as Konefal lay two.

Rieudeau's mates were far off their game as they were light off the broom time and again on the swangy centre sheet of ice.
