VICTORIA GARDENS IN FULL FLOWER

Letters of carpet of snow and a background of purple royal carpet place the location of the above photo at Victoria Gardens, situated on Brighton Road to the West of Government Pond. Now in a high state of cultivation, the gardens consist of seven large flower beds, a half-moon crescent of mock-orange, and a goodly number of trees, in addition to a flourishing surface of bright green grass and clover. The composition of the beds, apart from the lettered bed, is as follows: salvia edged with white; roses and double petunias edged with white allysum and blue Lobelia Hybrid Zinnias; pansies, edged with Royal Carpet, Allysum, and carpet of snow; phlox, edged with white. Trees include cedar, blue spruce, flowering crabapple, Norway spruce, birch, and others. A new fence, with steel posts painted white, has recently been constructed along the border of that portion of the Gardens fronting on the paved road to the West of Government Pond.
