ate Crime Committee twice last
year. He actually got eighteen
months! And this was his first
prison sentence since 1915! Makes
us feel good to be a Canadian.

Just how does the town of
Summerside rank in the matter
of juvenile delinquency? Are we
no better or no worse off than
other centres of our size, and
other victims of the general trend
of juvenile crime which, unfor-
tunately, seems to be a part of
the restless age we live in? Or
is Summerside's problems greater
than other towns? Judging by
the alarming frequency of bur-
glary and petty thievery in our
town, we suspect that in this de-
partment, the name of Summ-
erside, like that of Abou Ben
Adhem, leads all the rest. We
could be wrong, however.

Some satisfaction should give
us a few comparative figures, so
the citizens of Summerside may
know where we stand. Possibly
comparison with some other
towns might shock us out of our
complacency, and get us started
on a more efficient program of
youth welfare. On the other
hand, the figures might show that
bad as the situation is, we were
not worse off than others.

Certainly our service clubs in
Summerside are second to none
in their efforts to keep our youth
busy in worthwhile pursuits.
They deserve a world of credit
for what they are doing. What,
then, is the answer to our prob-
lem? Certainly a great deal more
than chasing after the young law-
breakers, and putting them in a
reformatory.

Reports Dominion Drama
Festival Faces Collapse

OTTAWA, April 16 — (CP) —
The Dominion Drama festival,
Canada's only national playhouse,
is running out of funds and faces
financial collapse, Richard Mac-
Donald, festival secretary, disclo-
sed today in an interview.
At the same time, it was learn-
ed that D. Park Jamieson of Bar-
nab, Ont., festival chairman, has
decided to resign. The Barnab
lawyer has been a member of
the executive for the last 16 years
and chairman for the last four.
Selection of a new chairman and
the current economic difficulties
will be two major issues for the
annual court of D. D. F. governors
when it convenes at Saint John,
N. B. on May 2. Saint John is
the site of this year's festival.
This national organization, in-
strument by which Canadian stage
and writing talent has been nur-
tured and developed during the
last 20 years, has been hit by
climbing operating costs and a
dearth of donations.
"We are searching for a way
out," said Mr. MacDonald, 52-
year-old stage veteran from Ed-
monton, to whom the development
