It was agreed that the school be cleaned, blinds repaired, screens bought for the windows and supplies to be purchased by Mrs. Donald MacLaine.

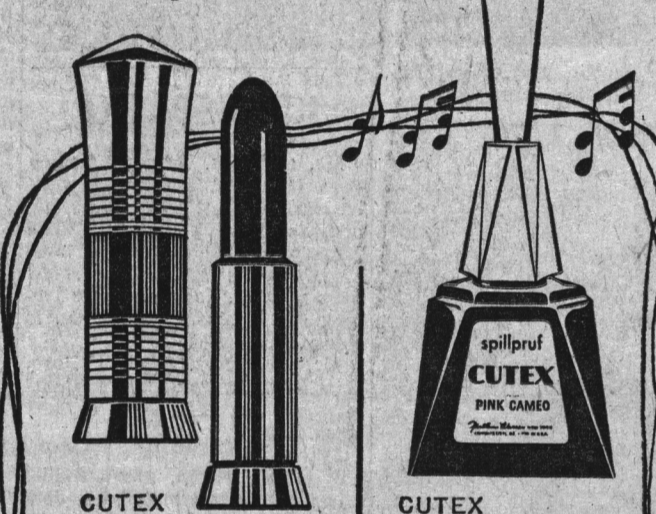

**DEATH WARNING**  
ALGIERS (Reuters) — Algerian insurgents have warned the people in the Guelma region of Algeria that any Moslems helping to run the voting in Sept. 20 referendum for a proposed French constitution will be executed to death. French authorities here said Thursday.

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
