

Late Telegrams.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—You Bueist arrived at Munich on the 8th instant, and remained there in conference with the Bavarian Cabinet two days.

The report is reiterated here the delay in the bombardment of Paris is due to the earnest entreaties of Victoria.

The Russian Minister has read to Granville a letter from Prince Gortschakoff, stating that Russia now demands a modification or the abolition of the provisions signed at the Convention at Paris on the 30th of March, 1856, and articles 11 and 12 of the Treaty of Paris, April 27th, 1856.—This declaration, on the part of Russia, being simultaneously made in London, Constantinople, Vienna and Berlin, is believed here to indicate Russia's readiness to accept the Russian claims for claims by force.

The excitement in London, to-night, is high, respecting the designs of Russia. It is believed that she has a secret understanding with Prussia. A telegram from Constantinople states that the Turkish Government had received no notice of Russia's intention to abrogate the treaty of 1856.

On the 10th a portion of the Bavarian ammunition train, losing its way, fell into the hands of the French.

No movements are reported to-day. Absolute quiet prevails around Paris.

Consols closed at 92 7/8.

A serious riot occurred at Cork, to-day, between fifty soldiers and citizens, in which several soldiers, citizens and policemen were seriously injured. It was finally quelled by police.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The announced intention of Russia to break from former treaties causes a mutual distrust throughout Europe, and alarm in Austria and England. Her designs are more particularly toward Austria. The secret treaty between Russia and Prussia will prevent the interference of Russia in the French war. A defensive alliance between Austria and England is probable.

A battle is imminent at Tanyr. The army of the Loire is advancing on that town from Orleans.

Nothing later from Paris.

The parties lately captured from a balloon are still held as prisoners. At the Council, on Monday, Bismarck strenuously advocated shooting all captured balloons.

The Bell Mail Gazette declares that two dangers confront England—the Alabama difficulty and the Eastern question. The circumstance that lifted the latter to great and immediate importance made the former more formidable, because of the increasing probability of their being a combination.

Russia declares her design to grasp Turkey, and Prussia is ready to connive and even aid her. England is the only power to whom Turkey can look, and she is threatened with annihilation if she lifts a finger.

Consols closed 92 3/4.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Nijon has been recaptured by the French who after a brilliant engagement, drove the Prussians from the city. The Prussians are retreating north-east along the road leading through the towns of Manabeau to Ger. Prince Frederick Charles has reached the River Saone, his column converged at Sens and he will cross the River to the assistance of Von der Tann with an army estimated at 100,000 men.

In view of the possible movement of Russia southward, the British fleet of observation will be established in the Mediterranean with Malta as a rendezvous.

CORR, Nov. 15.—A great demonstration of sympathy was made here to-night. The meeting was presided over by the Bishop of the Diocese, and attended by the clergy of the diocese. Resolutions expressing personal sympathy for the Holy Father, lamenting the obstructions of his temporal power as detrimental to peace in Europe, and in favor of memorializing Her Majesty's Government on the subject, were adopted.

A Florence despatch says that the Quirinal has been entered by the Italian authorities. The keys could not be obtained and they picked the lock. Everything found within was seized. The seizure of the 20000 has called forth severe comments from a part of the Clerical Journals, and these all have been seized and confiscated.

Ship Geneva, from Liverpool to St. John, N. B., Oct. 8th, is probably lost, as some of the wreck picked up on the coast of Nova Scotia has been identified as a part of this vessel. She had a crew of twenty-two men, and it is supposed all perished on a reef of rocks in St. Ives Bay, Cornwall.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The Court of Austria has pronounced judgment on the Courts of Great Britain, Italy and Turkey, that immediate steps be taken for a combination between those powers and Austria. The Times says England will fulfil her treaty obligations to the last extremity. A joint note from the Powers of Europe interested in the preservation and continuance of the Treaty of 1856, is reported being in process of signature by their Representatives. The Russian Note retains the right of Russia to sovereignty over the Black Sea. It has been received from the various representatives of Russia in foreign Courts.

There has been a panic in the money market of Vienna, consequent upon the threatening aspect of political matters.

The British Admiralty has issued orders to have the British fleet prepared for sea. Preparations are being actively set on foot.

The advance of the Prussian army operating in the Eastern Department has reached the village of St. Jean, on the Saone, on their way to the City of Lyons, and is operating in the Northern Department of France has reached Chancy, in the Department of Aisne, and now threaten Cambria, a fortified town thirteen miles to the south and east of Lyons.

Despatches from Tours convey the intelligence that while a battalion of Mobilis was on its march to reinforce the command of Garibaldi, the men mutinied. Twenty-six of the ringleaders were arrested. They were shot on the spot, and the rest were marched forward to the north.

The question of an alliance between England, Austria, Italy and Turkey is discussed on all hands. Orders have been despatched for the recall of vessels of war from every station except such as are actually needed in foreign waters. A large concentration of ships at Portsmouth is already apparent, and the greatest activity prevails in all naval depots of the Kingdom. A powerful fleet will be immediately despatched to the Mediterranean.

In the best informed circles it is regarded that with the present pretensions of Russia a general European war is inevitable.

In Spain a civil war is imminent, growing out of the throne question.

LONDON, Nov. 16, p.m.—Consols closed at 92 1/2. Stocks and securities of all kinds are low, and the markets are flat in view of the crisis in the Eastern Department. There is much uneasiness in all circles.

Von Bueist seems anxious to complete an alliance between Austria, Italy, Turkey and England against Russia, evidently satisfied positive assurances to the contrary notwithstanding. He says that Austria is anxiously awaiting further developments. Continental securities are falling, the stock market is weak and feverish and no one knows whether England will go to war or not.

Earl Granville's letter to the English Ambassador at St. Petersburg, printed in full this morning, gives an interested person very little news what concerns England, she will not go to war. A letter from Warsaw dated the 10th says that the Reserve of the Russian army has for some time past been secretly called up. A report is current here that Von Meike is seriously ill at Chateau Armburg.

Further outrages have been committed on foreigners in Canton, and the execution of the Tientsin criminals has been deferred.

The feeling in the city is intense and the excitement is almost unprecedented. The Government finds itself pressed forward to an attitude which it did not designed at first to assume. This feeling so strong that the government is convinced that it is unsafe to resist it.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—A report was in circulation here that the Bremen Steamers "Hansa" and "Leipzig" were captured off Grimsby. Later information contradicts the report. Despatches from Madrid, of this date, announce that Prince Humbolt, Duke of Aosta, has been elected by the Constituent Cortes, King of Spain. One hundred and ninety votes were thrown in his favor. One hundred and twenty Members of the Liberal Party voted for the Duke of Montpensier. At a subsequent period the vote for the Duke of Aosta seems to have been unanimous.

The London papers of this morning contain the outlines of the Russian, at the present crisis of affairs, as insolent towards Great Britain. The British Cabinet will support the Treaty of 1856, by force of arms. The fortress of Gibraltar is being besieged, and the Channel Fleet has received orders to start immediately for the Mediterranean. Despatches from Vienna state that the English and Turkish Ambassadors to the Court of Austria had a long interview with the Austrian Ministry. The Austrian Cabinet has agreed to support these powers, and to form an offensive and defensive alliance. Information has been received from Tours, giving late Paris dates. The "Figaro," just received, denounces the Prussian forces. The French Government, and says that if the French authorities are determined not to take active measures the sooner they surrender Paris the better, as provisions are getting short. Prince Gortschakoff's circular says that the Emperor of Russia can no longer consider himself bound by the obligations and stipulations of the Treaty of Paris, of 1856, so far as these limit his right of sovereignty in and over the Black Sea, and on the coast of the Bosphorus, and in the appearance of this, the November number, we judge that for the coming year it will far outdo its former self. Commercial. BOSTON MARKET, Nov. 16.

The following are the wholesale prices obtained by commission houses for produce in good condition:—

BETTER.—There is no improvement in the market. We quote fine at 42 to 45 cts per lb. EGGS.—The market is firm and well supplied at 28 cts per dozen for prime Eastern. VEGETABLES.—A Belgian paper, "Landscape," is selling at 75 cents to 80 cents per bushel.

HAY.—There is a good demand and large receipts with prices a shade easier. We now quote prime Eastern cargo hay at \$27 to \$29 per ton. Straw \$27 per ton.

OATS.—The market is slightly up—sales at 53 to 55 cts per bushel.

PROVISIONS.—A moderate demand for small lots of provisions, and prices exhibit a tendency downwards. We quote jobbing prices of the wholesale trade as follows:—Clear pork, \$23, and city packed, \$23 to \$24 per lb. Lard, city tubs, 17c per lb. Ham, 20c, to 21c, per lb.

HALIFAX, Nov. 19.

The market for produce is, if anything, declining. Jacksons to-day only bring 25 to 30 cents per bushel. Oats are demanding former prices, from 42 to 45 cents per bushel. But is not in demand—low prices and slow sales. Turnips quote same as last week.

The market is fully supplied with Prince Edward Island produce, most of which finds ready sale. Potatoes are dull, the market being well supplied with those of Nova Scotia growth, and our crop was a very large one. Callcans have sold at auction at 25 cents; retail as follows:—No. 1, 40c; No. 2, 35c; No. 3, 30c; No. 4, 25c; No. 5, 20c; No. 6, 15c; No. 7, 10c; No. 8, 5c; No. 9, 2c; No. 10, 1c.

Shipping Intelligence. LOSS OF A SCHOONER WITH ALL HANDS.—The schr. Ocean Traveller, Captain James O'Brien, which left this port four weeks ago, for Sable Island, with cattle and provisions, discharged her cargo at the island several days afterwards and left to return, and not having since been heard of, she is probably been lost all on board. She was 71 tons burthen, was built at Lunenburg in 1866 and owned by Messrs E. J. G. and James Mavour, of that place. She had, for some time, been engaged in the light-house service, having been chartered by the Dominion Government for that purpose. There were six men besides the Captain on board.—H. Chron.

A Providence (R. I.) dispatch says:—The brig Mary Conroy, Capt. Meloy, from a Nova Scotia port for New York, with 280 tons of coal, struck a reef on the east end of Fisher's Island, at 5.30, this A. M., and is probably a total loss.

Yesterday morning the Dominion Schooner, Ellen G. McLane, Captain Betts, came into port having in charge an American fishing schooner. She was taken on Tuesday in Black Bay, Charlotte county, and at the time none of her crew were on board. The captain was away at St. George, but returned and found his vessel lying alongside the light-house, where she had been on board about 25 bushels of shot, but no flag, but her papers and flags plainly showed her nationality and business in our waters. The vessel is a snug pinky, named the Jomp, and a portion of the wood eastport, shows where she belonged. We understand she is owned by Mr. Asa Bucknam, of that place.—St. John's News, 14th.
