White House Role For Movie Star Bob Montgomery

WASHINGTON, (AP) - A one-time union official and admirer of Franklin D. Roosevelt has moved into the White House. He's been a Republican for years, however, and he's on the employer side of the bargaining table these days. Most people know him best as an actor and television producer. His name is Robert Montgomery. Reporters noticed that the handsome, well-dressed Montgomery had been around the presidential offices quite a bit lately. Thursday they asked about it and got the answer: Montgomery has been given a White House office—but no salary—so he can be handy to advise President Eisenhower on radio and television techniques. The Montgomery-to-Washington move didn't surprise the former Hollywood star's friends. Montgomery has been keenly interested in politics for a long time, and was a likely candidate for assistant secretary of the navy if Thomas E. Dewey had been elected president in 1948.

Part-Time Job

The new semi-official job of radio-TV adviser is only part-time for Montgomery. He's continuing to produce his Monday night television drama show, "Robert Montgomery Presents." Montgomery has advised the President from time to time before this, beginning with his Christmas Eve message. He directed chat with the public early this month, and made suggestions for improving delivery of the state of the union address. Few people know it but this isn't Montgomery's first White House stint. In 1942, when in the navy, he supervised installation of a wartime operations room there, and developed a warm admiration for Franklin D. Roosevelt. In his Hollywood days he starred in such pictures as "Night Must Fall" and "Here Comes Mr. Jordan."

Naval Strength Key To Victory

MONTREAL, (CP) - Vice-Admiral E. R. Mainguy, chief of naval staff, said Wednesday night naval strength will "always be the key to victory" despite the growth of air power. The airplane has not taken over the mass transportation role so vital to any country in time of war, he said in a speech to the Montreal United Services Institute. "The scientist is a potent ally in the development of more efficient fighting weapons but very seldom has he the final answer," vice-Admiral Mainguy said. "What we are doing is not so much inventing new weapons, but developing the power of existing ones."

New Demands By Postal Employees

LONDON, Ont. (CP) - A brief calling for all-round salary increases for postal workers was approved by the national executive of the Canadian Postal Employees' Association meeting here Wednesday. The brief, to be put before the civil service commission next month, calls for an increase of \$640 a year to give letter carriers a salary of \$4,000. The executive also decided to press for the principle of collective bargaining. The association will seek assurance that the 40-hour, five-day week, to be introduced April 1, will be effective in

Lon. Canon Charges Church Failing To Practice Its Theory. An advertisement for a book or pamphlet. The text reads: 'LONDON, (CP) - Canon L. J. Collins, chancellor of St. Paul's Cathedral, says the church is losing the confidence of Africans because it fails to practice its theoretical opposition to racial discrimination. Canon Collins told his congregation that the church, although it identifies itself with the just claims of Africans, tends to adopt a "white man's attitude." "The church as a whole has declared itself opposed to every form of racial discrimination. "But however commendable these pronouncements might be, the African will really judge our integrity not by what we say but by our behavior towards him, and our response to his aspirations." He said the "acid test" for churchmen lay in their answer to the question of mixed marriage. "Do we hoggle at giving an answer to those who think they elude the matter with the question, "How would you like your daughter to marry a black man?" "If we believe that all Christians are members of the body of Christ, how can we oppose a mixed marriage between Christians.'
