THE Roman Catholic Bishops of Ireland have passed a resolution condemning acts of violence and intimidation, and warning their flocks against indulging in illegal excesses. Such acts, they say, are certain to bring the anger of God upon the evil doers and their families, besides disgracing the Irish people in the eyes of the civilized world.

On examination, the correspondent of the St. John Sun found that in the corresponding issue for 1878 there was not a single such advertisement in that journal.

A pig sty, for instance, near the place where the planter stores his crops will impart a disagreeable flavor which no care afterwards will divert it. Among the precautions taken to obtain a flawless leaf for the "Myrtle Navy" brand, is to ascertain carefully the methods which every farmer adopts with his crops in the sections of Virginia where the "Myrtle Navy" is grown.

FAST SKATING.—The Managers of the Roller Rink have completed arrangements with Messrs. Snowden and Skinner, of New York, and Mr. Len Saunders, of St. John, for an exhibition of their speed, in the Roller Rink to-morrow night. Skinner is the champion short distance skater of the world, Snowden the champion six days' skater of the world, and Saunders is the champion skater of New Brunswick. Snowden has skated one hundred miles in seven hours, and eleven hundred and sixty-six miles in one hundred and forty-four hours. Skinner can skate a mile in 3 06 1/2, and five miles 15 49 1/2. Saunders time is also very fast. To-morrow night they will skate five miles at the height of their speed. The exhibition will commence at 9.30, and there will be skating for the public up to that time. Those who wish to see the fastest Roller Skaters in the world should go to the Rink to-morrow night.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Riel Further Expedit. LONDON, Oct. 13

The appeal of Louis Riel came up to-day for argument, but his counsel asked for a postponement until the arrival of Mr. Fitzpatrick, Riel's Canadian counsel, who was bringing with him important documents respecting the matter. Mr. Webster, Attorney General, opposed the request. The Court however agreed to postpone the case until the 21st inst. The Courtroom was crowded, but there was no excitement. Riel has been further respited to the 26th inst.

The Carolines Dispute. MADRID, Oct. 13. The despatch of the 3rd inst., stating that Germany acknowledged Spanish occupation of Yap, and that Spain granted Germany privileges of free navigation and commerce in the waters of the Carolines, and the right of establishing a coal station on one of the islands, is officially confirmed.

Nationalist Nominations. DUBLIN, Oct. 13. The Nationalist convention for nominating candidates for seats in Parliament for this city, assembled to-day, and selected M. O'Connell, editor of the Nation, and Sir Thomas Henry Gratian Esmond. Parnell thanked the delegates for the confidence they reposed in him.

The Eastern Difficulty. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 13. The troops which formed the garrison of Salamis are marching northward toward the Roumelian frontier. The Bulgarians are entrenched at Prestina, in Roumelia, near the frontier.

A Gunboat Ashore. LONDON, Oct. 13. During the prevalence of a heavy storm at Holyhead yesterday, Her Majesty's gunboat Dwarf was blown ashore there, the crew were saved. She is of 693 tons burthen, and carries four guns.

Railway Accident. LONDON, Oct. 13. Monday's train for Heidelberg, on which the Duchess of Edinburgh was travelling, collided with a goods train and several waggons were wrecked. The passengers were not hurt.

The Turf. LONDON, Oct. 13. The race for the Czarowitch stakes at Newmarket was won by Bouy's Plaisanterie, with Hungerford's Xema second, and Cannon's Postscript third. There were 22 starters.

Telegraphic. NEW YORK, Oct. 13. At a meeting of the executive committee of the Western Union Telegraph Co., today, the resignation of John Pender, of London, as a director, was submitted and accepted.

Egyptian Cotton. LONDON, Oct. 13. An Alexandria report says that the cotton crop is slowly coming into market, the crop amounts to 300,000 centares instead of 400,000 as has been estimated.

Aquatic. TROY, N. Y., Oct. 13. The double scull race between Hanlan, Lee, Courtney and Conley, was postponed on account of rain until first flag day.

The Bulgarian Troubles. PARIS, Oct. 13. France has agreed to Germany's proposals in regard to the settlement of Bulgarian troubles.

A Peace Policy Advised. VIENNA, Oct. 13. Austria has advised Serbia to stop her war preparations and adopt a peace policy.

Upper Province News Nuggets. OTTAWA, Oct. 13. Sir Charles Tupper is expected here to-morrow. The Presbyterian Board of Home Mission assemble in Toronto to-morrow. Riel's case before the Privy Council in England has been postponed till the 21st. Smallpox in Montreal is on the decrease. There were thirty-three deaths there yesterday.

A meeting of representatives of Insurance Companies doing business in Canada opened here this morning. Archbishop Lynch, owing to an attack of neuralgia, will be unable to attend the obsequies of Cardinal McCloskey. The will of Robert Walker has been entered for probate in Toronto. He leaves large legacies to the Methodist Church of Canada. Sir Adolph Caron received to-day the warrants under the Royal Sign Manual and Seal of the most distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, conveying to him the grant of that dignity and authorizing the dispensation of investiture as Knight Commander of the Order. He also received the insignia of the Order.
