IN MEMORIAM

ALLAN BERTRAM MISENER

A great shock came to the family of Allan B. Misener when his parents received the sad news of his accidental death due to drowning on August 2nd, 1958, in the Assiniboine River near Brandon, Manitoba. Upon finding the body, Dr. J. Johnson, applied artificial respiration, but life was found to be extinct.

Allan had entered the Deer Lodge Hospital in Winnipeg for treatment on July 2nd, and was discharged July 24. Then he went to Brandon to work.

He was the fifth of a family of eleven children, born in Stanhope on February 28, 1923. During his early life he was an active hockey and baseball player, well liked by his many friends. On April 10th, 1942, he joined the army at the age of nineteen. The theatres of service in which he served were: Canada, United Kingdom, Central Mediterranean area, and Continental Europe, and was honourably discharged on March 18th, 1946 in Halifax, Nova Scotia from his rank as a trooper. His medals and decorations during the war included his 1939-45 Star, Italy Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp and War Medal 1939-45.

He leaves to mourn besides his grief stricken parents, five brothers, John, White Horse, Yukon; Thomas and Elmer, Toronto, Ontario; Leary and Linus at home; also five sisters, Etta, (Mrs. Don Acker), Delhi, Ont.; Anna (Mrs. David Clarke) and Edith, Trenton, Ont.; Jean, (Mrs. Sheldon Gunn), West St. Peters, P.E.I. and Laura, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

His funeral service was held at the Brockie Donovan Chapel on Friday, August 8th., at 3:30 p.m. Rev. D. E. Noonan of St. Georges Anglican Church officiating at the chapel and committal services, also Legion interment services were conducted by W. Jackson.

Interment was in the Veterans' Plot, Brandon Cemetery where his grave is marked by a cross

NZ GOV-GEN. GIVES DUTIES

HASTINGS, N.Z. (CP) — Lord Cobham, governor-general of New Zealand, in a speech here gave this definition of his duties:

"The governor-general opens everything, including Parliament (once a year), new memorial halls (once a month), old people's homes (once a week), new schools (once a day) and his mouth (all the time)."

"He lays foundation stones in the pouring rain and gives garden parties in a temperature of 95 degrees."

"He is expected to hold opinions but not to express them and he is a target for every crackpot in the whole world who writes daily to protest against every human action performed or projected from the undue noise made by a jet fighter to the cleaning of the Sphinx."

Funeral Held Of James M. Curley

BOSTON (AP) — Thousands paid sorrowful tribute Saturday to James Michael Curley as funeral services were held for the golden-voiced Democratic political campaigner at the Roman Catholic Cathedral of the Holy Cross.

The former governor, congressman and Boston mayor died Wednesday, age 83.

Curley's son, Rev. Francis X. Curley of Holy Cross College, sang the solemn requiem mass at which Archbishop Richard J. Cushing presided.

As some 2,500 mourners knelt in the cathedral, thunders more, heads bowed and many weeping, gathered outside to whisper final prayers.

Police estimated that more than 50,000 persons lined the route of the 30-car funeral cortege.

Truro Trade Board Drops Talk For New Action Plan

TRURO, N. S. (CP) — On the theory actions speak louder than words, the Board of Trade is behind a move for industrial pro-

tection in this central Nova Scotia town that Mayor J. G. Glassey says he's "never seen the like of before."

"The nerve centre of the province now no longer is Halifax, it's right here in our town," says board President J. M. Murphy.

Businessman Harold B. Goodspeed claims "We've got the people thinking about what they can do themselves."

The 150-man board decided this spring to "stop talking and start acting." "We decided if all we could do was talk, we might as well fold," Mr. Murphy said. A rebirth followed. Full-page advertisements boosting Truro as an industrial centre and "a nice place to live" were published in the province's biggest daily newspapers.

NEW GIRLS COLLEGE

When the provincial government decided to move the school

for the deaf out of Halifax, the board went after it for their town. They didn't get it. "But we feel they didn't get it. Our efforts it was chiefly through our efforts that then that the government gave us instead a new provincial girls' college," Mr. Murphy said.

When a new \$1,700,000 paved highway was completed between here and Tatamagouche last month, the board arranged a celebration which included a three-day shopping spree to attract shoppers living along the new 26-mile long highway.

Truro is a dairying and lumbering town of about 12,000 persons. It's 64 miles from Halifax and already has achieved industrial importance as a textile, warehousing and distribution centre.

The town's 43 industries employ 943 persons manufacturing goods to the value of more than \$7,500,000 annually.
