Editorial Notes.

It is significant that the London Times, since the advent of the McDonald administration, has become a warm friend of Canada.

As an answer to some statements of THE EXAMINER, which it cannot rebut, the Patriot says THE EXAMINER is drawing \$10,000 a year from the Dominion Government.

Irish-Americans who have visited the old country during the summer report that the farming class has not been for years in so prosperous a condition.

In his remarks before the Yale students, Lord Coleridge said: "I must publicly argue here, that as a lawyer and a judge I most heartily am in favor of the classics."

On the 30th of October the Patriot stated that—

The recent losses sustained by the banking institutions of the country have alarmed capitalists who have deposits in the banks, and on Sir Leonard's advertisement appearing, they hastened to seek investment in Government bonds at a low rate of interest.

On the 1st of November the Patriot quotes the statement of the Mail's Ottawa correspondent, that the result of Sir Leonard's advertisement is that—

The total amount tendered for was \$1,177,000, of which \$977,000 was accepted, being at or above par, and the balance of \$200,000 offered was unaccepted.

And fails to see in the latter fact, a complete reputation of its former slander about "the lack of confidence in the business of the country!"

Some of the papers say that Lord Lansdowne is cordially disliked by the people of Ireland. On the other hand, it is said that the statement is wholly untrue.

"Let me thank you, sir, for your reference to myself and my connection with Ireland. I have spent a considerable portion of my life among Irishmen, and that portion has not been the least pleasant."

Seizing Government Property.

THE "BROAD R" PLACED ON THE STATION, FREIGHT HOUSE, LOCOMOTIVES, ETC., AT SUMMERSIDE.

A man named Brown, from the North Shore, entered the Railway yard at Summerside yesterday morning. He approached the shunting engine and drawing the attention of the driver, said, "If you move that locomotive it is at

THE PERIL OF YOUR LIFE." The driver did not move. He noticed that the individual who so summarily commanded him to be at ease, was an extraordinary character, and might have some authority.

After giving this command, Mr. Brown took from his pocket a piece of white chalk and placed a "Broad R" on the side of the engine. He then proceeded to the Freight House. On his departure the driver of the shunting engine perceived that a "Broad R" had been placed—no doubt by Mr. Brown—on the Station, Freight House, and all empty cars in the yard.

Entering the Freight House he bade the clerk lock the doors, and allow nothing to be removed without his permission. He then proceeded to put the "BROAD R." on all freight in the shed, including empty egg cases. The station master made a vigorous protest against Mr. Brown's high handed proceedings, but he was treated as the idle wind which the broad R gentleman respected not.

Subsequently he was arraigned for examination before His Honor Stipendiary Magistrate Howe. The revolver was examined and every chamber was found to be loaded. Dr. Jarvis gave evidence, and pronounced Brown to be a crank. The prisoner was then remanded for further examination.

It is whispered in Summerside that Brown is one of those grits who believe that the N. P. has ruined Canada, and that it is now time to seize Government property for the benefit of all concerned.

Current Clippings.

Several ironclads have been ordered to be in readiness to reinforce the French squadron in China.

Canada Pacific railroad stock advanced 10 per cent. on the report that the Government had guaranteed 3 per cent. interest.

Moody and Sankey's revival missions in Cork have been largely attended, and, it is reported, very successful. They have gone to Waterford to continue their labors.

A meeting was held a few days ago at Liege, Belgium, to advocate universal suffrage. A resolution was adopted favoring the holding of a great public demonstration in Brussels in January next.

The English Government, it is reported, has decided to accept the proposition of the French Government to pay Missionary Shaw an indemnity of £10,000, with their apology to Great Britain, as a satisfactory settlement.

For the past thirty years there has been a steady decline in the production of gold in the United States. In 1853 the highest production was reached, the total figures being \$85,000,000. The figures for 1880 were \$36,000,000. The production of silver in 1853 was \$50,000,000; in 1882, \$47,000,000.

Despite the disapproval of the Colonial Minister, the projectors of the explorations in New Guinea have determined to proceed with the expedition. A steamer has been chartered and will take six months' provisions, tents, and arms. Each subscriber will obtain a land warrant for 1,000 acres.

By the end of October the Canadian Pacific Railway will be finished to the summit of the Rocky Mountains, 962 miles west of Winnipeg. On the eastern division the work is pushed 105 miles east of Port Arthur and 9,000 men will be kept on this section for the winter.

The whole line from Montreal to the Pacific will be completed by October 1885. Our readers will remember that by contract the road was to be built by 1891. Such has been the energy and ability of the Company that they will have finished their work full six years before the contract time. The manager says that authenticated assurances have been received of a large Scotch and English immigration to the Northwest next spring.
