THE steambot express arrived at ten minutes past ten o'clock last night. The delay was owing to the large freights which are carried by the boats.

FOUR Scott Act cases were up for trial in Summerside yesterday. Two of these were dismissed for want of evidence, and the others were postponed until Saturday.

THE city of Brandon, Ont., which has just completed its first year of existence, has a population of three thousand. The amount of its assessment is four million dollars.

THREE Scott Act cases were commenced to-day, before Alex. Hayden, Esq., and William Heard, Esq., J. P.'s, for Queen's County. The case of James Curtis, Esq., Inspector of License vs. George O'Neill, Half-way House, resulted in a nonsuit, and another case brought by the Inspector against John Finlay, of Vernon River Bridge was also nonsuited. The case of H. H. Pollard against John Binn, vendor at New Glasgow, was postponed until the 28th inst.

SOME malicious person placed a condemned sleeper square across the rails on the Railway track, near Peake's Station, yesterday. The train, with a large number of passengers for Georgetown, came rolling along, but fortunately the driver saw the obstruction, and had the breaks applied, but not in time to prevent the engine passing over the rotten sleeper. No serious damage was done. The connecting pin broke, the engine separated from the cars, and the passengers on the train were very slightly shaken.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Suez Canal Prohibition

Arrest Of A Native.

A NEW RAILROAD.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

News reaches here that the authorities of the Suez Canal have prohibited the employment of any one who assisted the British forces during the last campaign. The order is received with no small degree of surprise here, and is an evidence of French feeling on the subject.

The native who wounded Cookson, the British Consul, during the June riots at Alexandria, has been arrested.

Eighty Frenchmen, and fourteen hundred African laborers are about to construct a railroad between the Niger and the Senegal Rivers. As there is much danger anticipated, the operations will be protected by a military column.

The Irish Convention.

EGAN RESIGNS.

The Land League Funds.

DUBLIN, Oct. 17.

There was much excitement and liveliness manifested here to-day in consequence of the opening of the Great National Convention. Parnell is presiding. At present there are eight hundred delegates present. Nearly all the suspects who have been imprisoned were present. A committee is to be appointed to summon an elected convention. This Convention will select an executive to control the affairs of the Land League. A statement of the balance in the Land League has already been submitted to the Convention. The total funds are £244,820. The expenditure is:—for relieving distressed tenants £50,000; for state trials, £15,000; for general expenditure, £158,000. The balance sent in amounts to £32,000. A letter was read from Egan, who is living in Paris, tendering his resignation as Treasurer of the Land League.

[It is believed that the principal object of the Irish League will be the prosecution of a vigorous agitation for the amendment of the Land act as a preliminary to the abolition of landlordism by purchase. Special stress will be laid on the definition of Mr. Healy's clause so as to secure to tenants the entire value of their past and future improvements on the admission of lease-holders to the benefit of the act and on the advance of the entire purchase money by the State at a low rate of interest, the principal to be paid during an extended period. Proposals will also be advocated for the purchase of poor, rack-rented estates for the benefit of tenants. The claims of laborers to better dwellings and allotments will be incorporated in the programme. Laborers will be invited to co-operate in obtaining such improvement in the Land act as will enable farmers to deal generously with them. The industrial revival will be assisted by local organizations for fostering the demand for Irish manufactures. Other points of the programme are the payment of members of Parliament, the extension of the franchise and the establishment of a system of elective county governments. It was understood that at the conference a deputation from the Home Rule League will announce the dissolution of that body and the resignation of its functions into the hands of the new Irish League, of which national self-government will be the basis.]

A HEAVY FAILURE.

Elevations to the Bench.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.

A. & C. J. Hope & Co., of Hamilton, Toronto, and Montreal, have failed. The liabilities will reach \$100,000. The creditors have called a meeting for next Friday. The firm was doing a large business in hardware.

Judge McKay, of the Superior Court has resigned and receives a pension. He is succeeded by Judge Doherty of St. Francis District. Edward Towle Brooks, Esq., ex-M. P. for Sherbrooke, will succeed Judge Doherty.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 16.

The Times' Cairo correspondent telegraphs that a decree of the council of ministers proclaiming the deposition of the Khedive, the existence of which Arabi denied, has been found at the house of Rifat Bey bearing his signature and that of other ministers.

Steamer Preston is still ashore near Berwick. Although a life boat went to her the crew refused to leave, thinking she would be floated in the morning by the aid of tugs. Some flour has been thrown overboard. According to the latest reports the steamer is still hard and fast. The crew is still on board.

The cargo of steamer Preston, ashore near Berwick, is still being thrown overboard. Three tugs were in attendance yesterday, but nothing could be done towards floating the vessel. This morning the Preston remains broadside to the sea in a bad position. No lighters or boats can get alongside of her.

DUBLIN, Oct. 16.

Three London detectives have arrived here with three of the crew of the Gladstone, on which Westgate, the self-accused assassin of Lord Frederick Cavendish and Under-Secretary Burke, sailed for the West Indies. The sailors have been subjected to a searching examination. The authorities are determined to thoroughly sift Westgate's story, so as to quiet the public mind. Westgate will probably be brought here for the same purpose; but the police firmly adhere to the belief that Westgate is crazy and his assertions unworthy of belief.

VIENNA, Oct. 16.

A telegram from Odessa states that the Liza mail has been robbed. The postillion

was murdered and five hundred thousand roubles stolen.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.

The British ship Bremen, Dougall master, from Liverpool, ran ashore on Farallone Island, this morning, during a dense fog. The crew were saved and brought here by the schooner Daisy Rowe. The vessel will probably be a total loss.

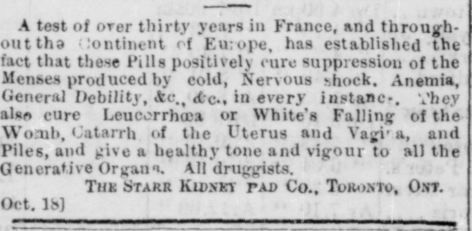
