WORTHY OF SPECIAL MENTION.—Among the many interesting and curious articles exhibited in the ladies' department of the Exhibition was a cotton quilt, containing 2,470 pieces, made by the widow of the late Mr. Swan, who was for many years watchman at the Ch'town Railroad Station. Mrs. Swan is in her 78th year.

AGAINST THE RAILWAY.—A Fall River, Mass., despatch states that the case of Wm. Miller vs. the Old Colony Railroad was concluded on Wednesday. Miller, it will be remembered, got off a train at Riverside, on the opposite side from the depot, and was struck by a train coming in the opposite direction. He lost a leg at the knee and claimed \$20,000 damages on the score of negligence on the part of the road. The jury brought in a sealed verdict in favor of the plaintiff.

HELD FOR MANSLAUGHTER.—A despatch from Digby says a sensation was caused there on Wednesday by the announcement by Judge Meagher that he had been instructed to investigate the recent poisoning of Crozier by a mistake of R. F. Stark, in putting up a prescription, using strychnine instead of a drug. If it was proved that there was carelessness, Stark would be held for manslaughter. It was so decided, and Stark is so held. Great sympathy is expressed for the unfortunate druggist in the peculiar position in which he is placed.

MORE FORCIBLE THAN ELEGANT.—An exchange says: Rev. Mr. Talmage doesn't appear to have lost any of his vigor. Here is a sample of his discourse last Sunday: "The church, he said, is dying of fastidiousness. We shed tears for the woes of the world on hundred dollar pocket handkerchiefs, and then drop pennies into the poor boxes. We yearn to help the poor and oppressed, but we beg to be excused from touching hands whose finger nails are in mourning for departed soap."

OMISSION.—In the last paragraph of Judge Young's letter, published in THE EXAMINER a few days ago, the printer left out the words "the inhabitants." This omission rendered the sentence meaningless. It should read that this Exhibition, &c., "will be the means of convincing the world that the inhabitants of this Gem of the Sea, &c., are an industrious and enterprising people, and second to none in the Dominion of Canada."

A PECULIAR CASE.—A somewhat peculiar case is now before the court of appeal in Montreal. A few years ago a Mrs. Browne sued her son-in-law for support, claiming that she was in want, that her husband was intemperate and was unable to support her, and that her son-in-law had sufficient means to render her assistance. Judgment was given in her favor, and the defendant was ordered to pay seven dollars a week for his mother-in-law's support—"as son-in-law and daughter-in-law are subject to the same obligations as children." From this judgment appeal is made solely on the ground that the evidence did not support the judgment, but it is expected the mother-in-law will win.

LAID TO REST.—The funeral of the late Captain Michael Hickey took place yesterday afternoon. Although the weather was wet and disagreeable, there was a large attendance. All classes and creeds were represented, making up a procession the like of which has not been seen in Charlottetown for some time. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

News from Halifax.

HALIFAX, Oct. 4.

Ex county detective Phelan was arrested on Saturday night by his successor in office, Constable Burbridge, on a warrant charging him with retaining for his own purposes \$16, which he had collected for parties in Amherst.

Charles Hill, a young lad of 12 years, while attempting to board a local train at Trenton Saturday evening missed his footing and was crushed under the wheels. One of his legs was completely severed at the ankle, the other foot was mangled and his head was also badly cut. He is not expected to recover.

A man named Frank Armstrong was run over on Saturday evening by the Windsor and Annapolis express train, about a mile west of Windsor Junction. The man appears to have been lying on the track with his feet toward the coming train. The fire-box of the engine apparently caught one foot and threw it over the rail, where it was crushed off by the wheel of the locomotive.

The other leg was doubled up over the body, the trunk pushed along the track by the fire-box for some fifty yards, the head torn off and rolled into the gutter, and the heart, lungs, etc., crushed out through the neck. Near the limb which was first amputated, and where the unfortunate fellow was first struck was found a bottle partially full of rum. The remains were gathered up and brought to the city today. An inquest was held by Coroner Hawkins.

English Opinion.

TORONTO, Oct. 4.

Both the Empire and Globe this morning publish special cable despatches regarding the manner in which Sir John Macdonald's speech in Halifax, on Wednesday, a summary of which was cabled to England, is received there. The Empire's despatch says: "The speech attracts much attention in all quarters, and caused much rejoicing among the Conservatives, who accept the Canadian Premier's statements as voicing the sentiments of the majority of Her Majesty's subjects in the Dominion."

The Sawm Lumber Duty.

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.

In an interview yesterday the Commissioner of Customs stated that the question of carrying out the promise made in reference to abolishing the export duty on sawn lumber by the McKinley Bill is made conditional on this action being taken and lumbermen are pressing for its consideration.

The Fires Quenched.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

Fires have been quenched in all the Scotch iron furnaces which do not belong to the masters combination which manufacture iron for private purposes. The lockout will reduce the market supply to 20,000 tons weekly.

Cotton Factory Sold.

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.

It is said that the Halifax Cotton Factory has been disposed of to a Syndicate at 50 cents on the dollar. Quite a lot of stock has been sold by shareholders during the past month at 20 cents and 25 cents.

The Horse Trade.

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.

The Montreal horse exchange are shipping a number of French-Canadian horses to the Island of Martinique, in an endeavor to open up a trade in the West Indies.

Potato Shipments.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 4.

Large quantities of potatoes are being hurried from here across the border in consequence of the coming into force of the McKinley bill on Monday.

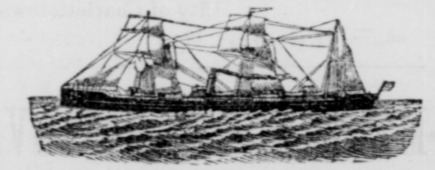
