House To Open Feb. 22, Premier Shaw Announces

The regular session of the provincial legislature this year opens on February 22.

The date was announced by Premier Walter R. Shaw following yesterday's meeting of the government's Executive Council.

Premier Shaw and other government officials have said recently that "not more than the usual amount of legislation" is expected to be considered at the forthcoming session. Last year about 50 bills were passed.

VILLAGE WIPED OUT

Thousands Feared Dead In Peruvian Avalanche

LIMA, Peru (AP) — A 12-yard-deep mass of mud, rock and melting ice, sluiced down a towering mountainside by an enormous avalanche, entombed the Andean village of Ranrahira and most of its 500 people Thursday.

Peruvian officials feared hundreds more in the area may have died in one of the worst disasters of its kind. Their fears were based on fragmentary reports, however.

In the first shock of the disaster which struck Wednesday night, some officials speculated that the final toll might be around 3,000. But later they said it would be some time before they could determine the

Winds Fell Trees, Kill Six Britons

LONDON (CP) — Toppling trees killed at least six Britons Thursday as winter winds swept across country at up to 100 miles an hour. Two ships sank in churned-up coastal waters and others called for help.

At Romford, near London, pieces of a blown-off roof smashed under an 80-year-old elm tree. Three other persons died when trees fell on their automobiles and a farmworker was stricken in a field.
