

Seal Conservation Urged By Minister Of Fisheries

HALIFAX (CP) — Fisheries Minister H.J. Robichaud urged delegates attending the 13th annual meeting of the international commission for the Northwest Atlantic fisheries to make an early examination into the harvesting every spring of hump seals off Canada's east coast.

Mr. Robichaud, in the opening speech of the week-long meeting, said hump seals were a "very vulnerable resource which has been under close study by Canadian biologists and administrators for many years."

"I would strongly urge that an early examination be made into the effects of fishing on the stocks of these seals with a view to obtaining international accord on suitable conservation measures."

In addition to Canada, at least two of the 13 countries represented at the meeting send sealing vessels to the Gulf of St. Lawrence and to the Front-of-Newfoundland's northeast coast. Norway has been sending sealing ships for a number of years and Russia began sending vessels two years ago.

Robichaud said earlier in an interview that "seals deserve more consideration" and he hoped the commission would include sealing in its discussions.

House Briefs
OTTAWA (CP)—Cost of modification (CF-104) low-level jet bombers made after delivery to the RCAF Station Summerside, Cornwall, Ontario, was \$250,000, a privy councillor said in a Commons reply.

Mr. Holroyd said the modifications were carried out in Europe so that there would be no delay in the "agreed schedule" of delivery for the planes.

A total of 44,222 persons left Canada in the year ended June 30, 1962, to take up residence in the United States, the immigration department said Monday in a Commons return. In the 1962 calendar year, 11,648 immigrants came to Canada from the U.S.

Prime Minister Pearson described Russia's proposal for a nuclear-free Mediterranean zone as "propaganda in tone and timing."

However, he added in a Commons reply that any proposal from Russia was likely to be important and Canada was prepared to give this one further consideration if it came up in east-west negotiations.

Mr. Pearson said the proposal doesn't include mention of any Communist territory in the Mediterranean zone and therefore wasn't likely to contribute to security. Neither was there any mention of verification procedures.

State Secretary Pickersill told the Commons that all French-speaking members of the cabinet have been interviewed in turn on a daily CBC French television news program, *Aujourd'hui* (Today).

Replying to a written question by Louis-Joseph Pigeon (PC—Quebec), the minister of justice said he had the same procedure was not followed after the federal elections of 1957, 1958

and 1962 because the program was not on the air at that time. Speaking in French, Mr. Pickersill added amid laughter: "The reply is incomplete because I was not invited to appear on this program."

Privy Council President Maurice Lamontagne, in a Commons reply said the makeup of the royal commission on bilingualism will be announced soon.

He declined to indicate whether any of the members will represent ethnic groups other than English and French.

The four parties in the Commons are trying to pare the membership of House standing committees.

This was revealed when State Secretary Pickersill, Government House leader, said in a Commons reply that the standing committees will be chosen until discussions on reducing membership are ended.

After that, he added, the personnel will be chosen.

Cutter Launching Set For Picot
PICTOU, N.S. (CP)—The 90-foot Canadian coast guard cutter Rapid will be launched here Wednesday. When completed it will be used for search and rescue work, weather reporting and routine patrol along the eastern seaboard of Canada.

The \$1,000,000 vessel patterned after United States Coast Guard cutters, will be christened by Mrs. C. W. Harrison of Ottawa, wife of the chief commissioner of the RCMP.

A sister ship of the Rapid, the Rally, was launched last week at Quebec. The two vessels each
