Noted Catechetist Conducts Institute

Doctor Thomas Francoeur, Ph.D. well known Canadian psychologist and catechetist, Dean of the Faculty of Theology at St. Joseph's Teacher's College, Montreal, arrived in Charlottetown Friday afternoon to conduct a one day Catechetical Institute. The Institute will be held at Saint Dunstan's Basilica Recreation Center with sessions at 10 a.m., 2 p.m., 4 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. today, Saturday, November 12. The central theme, Religious Education, will be treated in these four lectures under the following topics: The Evolution of Catechetics, New Approaches in Catechetics, Courage in

Change, and, The Impact of the Religion Teacher. Last evening, Dr. Francoeur addressed a gathering of over 100 parents and teachers at the Basilica Recreation Centre and laid heavy stress upon the love encounter relationship of the three basic Christian sacraments of initiation, Baptism, Confirmation, and Communion. He treated these in the light of the young children with whom these parents are actually dealing. Dominion Curling Head Honored By Local Curlers

A ceremony honoring the first Charlottetown man ever to be elected president of the Dominion Curling Association, Hon. Gordon Bennett, minister of education, will be held at the Charlottetown Curling Club Sunday evening. The association headed by Mr. Bennett has approximately 150,000 male curlers across Canada, only 600 of them in this province. Next spring he will preside at the Brier, emblematic of the curling championship of Canada, when it is held in Ottawa as part of the Capital's celebration of this country's Centennial. In honor of a fellow member's elevation to the top post in Canadian curling, the Charlottetown Curling Club will have Mr. Bennett as guest of honor at a function involving a buffet supper and special presentation. Clifford Campbell, president of the

local club, will preside and call on one of the long time curlers, Dr. E. Sterling Giddings, to make the presentation. Expected guests will include His Honor Lieutenant Governor W. J. Macdonald, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, himself a former president of the DCA, Premier Alex Campbell and Mayor Walter J. Cox. "MY FULLBACK" Always interested in sports as a youth, his activity centred around football when as a student at Prince of Wales he was watched kicking a ball by the coach of the football team. That day the coach remarked to an aide "There is my new fullback." That coach is now the representative of Her Majesty The Queen in this province. After he left PWC Mr. Bennett taught school in St. Eleanor's and only recently recalled that though the salary was small back in 1931 he received a special "supplement" from the district. That supplement is the charming Mrs. Bennett of today whom he first met in St. Eleanor's. Mr. Bennett returned to his studies and graduated from Acadia. He then came back to the Island and for a time taught at West Kent School. Then in 1939 he followed the path of his former football coach and started teaching at Prince of Wales. It went further than that and the day came when he succeeded to the position of coach relinquished by the beloved Billie Archie, as he was known to thousands of students then, but is almost as well known today as the Lieutenant Governor.
