Museum Director Announces Grant

Moncrieff Williamson, Confederation Centre Gallery and Museum Director said yesterday that the Charlottetown Gallery has been awarded a grant of \$9,300 by the Canadian Council. The grant was announced during the council meeting recently concluded in St. John, New Brunswick.

Commenting on the grant Mr. Williamson stated, "This is splendid news. The money will enable us to make tremendous progress during the coming year, particular with documentation of the Robert Harris collection."

The grant is being made in response to a brief submitted by the Gallery Director in June of this year requesting funds to employ a researcher who will use the Harris material as the basis for a doctoral thesis at the University of Toronto. The University is also to assist in the financing of the project.

The major collection of paintings, sketches, letters and other memorabilia of Robert Harris is held by Confederation Centre Gallery, Harris, who emigrated to Prince Edward Island from Wales in 1854 became one of Canada's leading portraitists, a charter member of the Royal Canadian Academy, and the painter of Canada's best known historical painting, "The Fathers of Confederation."

The Gallery has for the past year been cataloguing and evaluating the Harris works and artifacts in its collection.

A portion of the grant will also be used to assemble a special exhibition titled "Director's Choice," which will open at Confederation Centre Gallery in the fall of 1967. It will consist of works borrowed from galleries across the country which have been purchased under the Canada Council matching grants program.

Included in the grant as well is a special sum of \$1,000 for the purchase of books for the art reference library and \$500 additional film strips and slides to add to the gallery's extension department collection.

"I feel that this grant indicates the Canada Council's confidence in the gallery and its future plans and operation," commented Mr. Williamson. "It always takes some time for a young gallery to prove itself and acquire the necessary funds and subscriptions to carry out its work, and with grants such as these we are at least part of the way in realizing the full potential of Confederation Centre Gallery."

"It's my hope that the Canada Council support may impel private citizens and business concerns to assist as well in the manner of the splendid contribution made recently by Robert Cotton of Charlottetown."

Mr. Cotton, a retired real estate broker, has set up a \$100,000 trust fund for use by the gallery and library sections of the arts centre.

The Charlottetown Summer Festival will complete its nine week season despite the possible effect of the railway strike on potential tourist audiences, Festival Artistic Director Mavor Moore said yesterday.

"The Festival Company is in Charlottetown to do a full season," said Moore. "And the show will go on."

"We realize of course that the uncertainty of whether or not there will be a full ferry service may have an effect on the tourist traffic during the last week of the season, but we are also aware of our obligation to those visitors who are still in the province and to the people of Prince Edward Island."

"It has been most heartwarming to the Festival Company to see visible evidence of increased support for the Festival this summer, and we have been much encouraged by the wholehearted backing of Islanders. We feel we owe them something in return, and this has been a major factor in deciding to complete the season despite a possible drop in potential audience."

The final week is devoted entirely to our two musicals, "Anne of Green Gables," and "Turvey," so this last week is a splendid time for Island residents to come on in and see Anne. Again on Wednesday both performances were sellouts, and we do know of many people who have been unable to get tickets so far this year.

"We also suspect that there are many Islanders who have not yet had an opportunity to see Turvey during the busy holiday season. We hope they will avail themselves, now the pressure is relaxing a bit, of this last opportunity to see this sparkling musical comedy."
