### Speakers Commend Work Of PEI Historic Society

"There is a great opening and a future for the P. E. Island Historic Society which I hope the nucleus here tonight will take advantage of and intergroup the people of the whole Province at its development," Premier Matheson said last evening following an address of Capt. W.B. Armit, R.D. R.C.N., (R) curator at the Army Museum Halifax Citadel, at a supper meeting in the P.E.I. last night. "You have a very important function and if you can get membership from all over the province we will do our best to back you to a degree," the Premier said. Speaking along the same lines, Mayor J. D. Stewart commended the Society for its activity thus far. "A start must be made in the city towards the development of a Provincial museum, which would, I believe, be located in Charlottetown. The paper quotes Mr. Brehaut on the splendid work she has done in gathering items of interest and developing a deeper interest in the preservation of such items to posterity." He assured the members of the support of the city administration, when the society has made a start such as Premier Matheson had described.

### MILITARY DRAFTS HERE

Turning to Prince Edward Island, Mr. speaker said he had searched the records available to him in Halifax and found that the British regiments which had drafts in P. E. I. in the middle of the last century consisted of the 9th Regiment of Foot (Queen's Own Royal West Kents), 42nd Royal Highlanders, and probably the 76th Regiment of Foot, 2nd Battalion the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, the regiment in Charlottetown was incorporated in stirring terms" said Capt. Armit. "Early in 1854, war was declared against Russia. Nova Scotia, in common with other British North-American Colonies, entered heartily into the spirit of the contest, both Legislative Council and House of Assembly sending addresses to Her Majesty expressive of loyalty and willingness to assist by maintaining the defence of the Province should the rights of Great Britain be attacked on these coasts. The Governments perhaps optimistically informed the Imperial authorities that if it became necessary to withdraw one or both of the regiments then in garrison at Halifax, an effective military force could be raised in the Provinces to undertake the duties of the garrison, and it could be augmented to a strength of fifty thousand men.

### Starling Area Suffers Major Trade Setback

LONDON (Reuters)—A government report Tuesday underlined that Britain and her sterling-area partners suffered a major financial setback in trade with the rest of the world for the last half of 1954. The sterling area showed a deficit of £164,000,000 in external trade for the period. Britain, banker for the area, had an overall trade deficit of £12,000,000.

The statistics were published in the treasury's economic survey. In the first half of 1954 Britain had a surplus of £172,000,000. The area as a whole showed a surplus of £171,000,000.

MORE OUT THAN IN The survey said the two main reasons for the reversal were: An increase in Britain's imports.

2. Worsening of terms of trade. This means the area sold its exports for less and paid more for imports.

A third reason, it said, was a fall in wool prices last fall. For 1955 prospects, the survey said: The immediate outlook for world trade appears reasonably favorable.

"In North America the demand for imports is showing signs of picking up following the business recovery which began last autumn."

### Claim New Paint Hides Objects From Radar

TORONTO (CP)—The Globe and Mail says today the Canadian Inventive and Scientific Associates claim to have the formula for a paint which can hide objects from a radar beam. John D. Laun, president of CISA who says they hold commercial rights to the product in Canada, would give few details. The Globe and Mail says the paper quotes Mr. Laun as saying that the paint was developed by two Swiss inventors whose names are being kept secret. Basis of the paint is believed to be vegetable material with the quality of preventing reflection of the radar beam.

### N. S. Members Suggest Finance Companies Probe

HALIFAX (CP)—Private members suggested in the Nova Scotia legislature Tuesday that finance companies should be investigated but the equally critical government suggested mum on whether an inquiry would be undertaken. Premier Hicks said that although interest rates on loans were regulated by the federal government, there may be some other aspect of their business we could probe.

He said a constituent borrowed money from a bank after considering a finance company and repaid the loan at six per cent.

"He would have paid about 30 per cent to a finance company," Mr. Hicks said. "It might well be that these companies should be subject to further regulations or legislation."

**HAVE "STRANGLE HOLD"**  
His remarks echoed those of G. I. Smith (PC-Colchester) who said "some things" about repercussions by the companies in lieu of payments "bear looking into."

Mr. Michael McDonald said the companies had a "strangle-hold" on borrowers. Criticism of the companies erupted into a full dress attack during consideration of government estimates when J. Clyde Nunn (L. Antigonish) said he viewed their operations "with misgivings."

### Led Adventurous Life

On Friday, March 11th, 1955, in the Charlottetown Hospital, the spirit of the late William J. Higgins took its flight to the Realm of the Great Beyond—from whose bourne no traveller returns.

Belonging to an ancestral line remarkable for longevity, Mr. Higgins was privileged to live far beyond the allotted years of "score years and ten"—he attained the advanced age of ninety four years and seven months.

Born at Kensington on August 16th, 1860, son of Gregory and Ellen Shields Higgins, who both lived over ninety years, his adolescence and young manhood were full of adventure and hazard. One of a family of eleven children raised on a farm, he saw the whole gamut of farm machinery inventions from the days of the sickle and scythe to the "combine" harvester.

His span of life was cast in a period of great world events, which he pursued intently in the limited newspapers and periodicals of earlier days.

He lived in time of the American Civil War, France-Prussia War, Canadian Confederation and the world shaking wars and political changes which have taken place since.

Having an unusually strong and active physique and constitution, he engaged in many of the pursuits of able bodied young men of the day—lobster fishing and canning in the summer; Maine and New England logging camps in the winter, thence to the Seattle boom in the late 1880's, railroading and bridge building for the Northern Pacific Railway in the wilds of the (then) "wild west" of 1893.

His next hazardous adventure was on the greatest gold rush the world has ever seen to the Klondike in 1898. At that time it was "no fly by night" affair it took months of preparation, outfitting and hard labor—only for the strong and resolute.

The "shooting" of the raging White Horse Rapids in an open boat was perhaps the greatest hazard of Mr. Higgins' active life. He guided the boat and companions through the maelstrom, with mind and muscles co-ordinating to the split second, into the serene water below.

After four years in the gold "diggings" he returned to Seattle where he was married to the late Maud Mc-

### Experimental Greenhouse Station Nears Completion

The new six section greenhouse to be used for cereal breeding at the Charlottetown Experimental Station is practically completed by the firm of Lord and Burnham, St. Catharines, Ontario. Work on the header-house, in connection therewith, is rapidly advancing.

In the greenhouse, experimental projects in the cross breeding of grain will be carried out with the idea of developing a variety which will possess stronger straw; have a bigger yield and at the same time be resistant to disease.

The poultry department at the Farm has received its first lot of chicks in the progeny testing experiment. In this experiment eight different strains of white Leghorn chicks are raised on a certain ration while at the same time a similar test is going on at six other stations throughout Canada.

All the eggs are hatched at Ottawa and with all the birds receiving the same kind and quantity of food, the only difference that could occur in the quality and quantity of egg production would necessarily result from environment. About 2,000 birds will be used in this experiment and the results of it will determine whether certain areas are suitable as an egg production centre or whether the birds are adaptable to the area.

Another experiment in connection with broiler birds will be repeated at the Farm for the third time. The chickens used during the past two years have been Broad Breasted Whites, crossed with New Hampshire Reds and White Rocks. These birds are not raised anywhere on Prince Edward Island except at the Experimental Farm. Results, thus far, have shown that they have a very high meat quality but an effort is being made to increase their hatchability and productivity. One thousand birds will be used in this broiler project.
