Urge Speed-up In Trans-Canada Highway Building

OTTAWA, June 10 (CP)—Two members of parliament said Thursday that more concerted efforts should be exerted in the building of the Trans-Canada Highway.

C. E. Johnston (SC—Bow River) and Julian Ferguson (PC—Simcoe North) made the request in the Commons as Resources Department estimates were studied.

Mr. Ferguson said the governments concerned should "get on with the job instead of puttering with it as Liberal and Conservative governments have done in the past."

Mr. Johnston said it appears little construction has been done in Ontario. There must be an acceleration of the work to finish the highway within the seven-year life of the highway agreements between the federal government and the provinces.

Percy Black (PC—Cumberland) asked what part of \$15,000,000 appropriated for highway work this year would be spent in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Winters said none would be spent in Nova Scotia since that province only recently entered the highway agreement. When Nova Scotia submitted plans, he would ask parliament for the appropriate funds for the work in Nova Scotia.
