

Georgetown Lions Plan For Christmas

GEORGETOWN — Christmas season activities of the Georgetown Lions Club were discussed and plans for their operation were finalized at a special meeting of the Club, held on Tuesday night in the Georgetown School and presided over by King Lion Allan MacPhee. The meeting opened with the Lions Prayer by Eric Wood and Herb Stewart acted as Secretary in the absence of the regular secretary, Harry McConnell.

It was decided to once again, erect and decorate a community Christmas tree, as has been done during the past several years. Glen Cameron, Billy Lavers and Ivan Stewart volunteered to get the large tree on Saturday and it will be erected in the area on Kent Street, be-

tween Water Street and Richmond Street and decorated during the coming weekend.

Three vehicles were involved in the initial collision at 5:50 p.m. a half-ton truck, owned by Gaudet and Sons, and driven by John Gordon Inman of Summerside, collided with a 1966 International, driven by Harry Roy Mathews of Summerside. The vehicle is owned by Everett Cameron. The third car involved was a 1962 Ford car, operated by Linus Alden Heffell, St. Eleanor's.

Total damage to the three vehicles was \$510.

In the six o'clock accident, a 1965 Ford, operated by Armand Gaston St. Amant of Summerside, collided with a Meteor Station wagon, driven by Cecil Francis Bulger of St. Eleanor's.

No estimate of damage was available on the second accident. Town police investigated.

Lobster Fishermen Hold Meeting At Birch Court

Lobster fishermen from Belle River to Victoria, met last night at Birch Court and renewed an agreement for a 400-trap limit in the 1967 season.

Marson Murchison, Point Prim presided and Lee Taylor, Nine Mile Creek was secretary. Some 400 fishermen attended.

400 TRAP LIMIT
The 400-trap limit per boat was in effect in a voluntary agreement basis during the lobster season last spring and fishermen felt it had worked out well.

Last night's meeting also reconsidered and endorsed resolutions adopted at a meeting last week.

SURVEY
One asked the department of

fisheries to make a survey of the Nova Scotia section of District 7 B, to which the Island men at the meeting belong, to ascertain and record the opinions of mainlanders on lobster limit and licence control.

Observers at last night's meeting included the president of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Federation Wesley Fraser, Souris; secretary of the federation, Gordon Rodd, Charlottetown; and Warren Farrar, district fisheries inspector, Charlottetown.

2nd Kings MLA Thinks Money Should Be Made Available

If the provincial government would make a firm offer in writing to Gulf Garden Foods Limited at Georgetown to make available a certain amount of the necessary operating capital the venture now lacks, the operation of the firm could probably resume within days, suggests Leo Rossiter.

"In all the statements by the government I have seen lately," said the former fisheries minister in a telephone interview from his place of business in Moncton, "there is no firm commitment on the part of Premier Campbell and his colleagues to put up some of the money, provided that Jess Moe and his associates match the amount or double it."

TOP PRIORITY
"I believe it is time that every-

body concerned settles down to a constructive approach to the problem. The top priority belongs to the job of getting these two or three hundred people back to work as soon as possible so that the local economy can recover what it can of lost ground," said Mr. Rossiter.

that the provincial industrial body authorized disbursed the province's money to the contractors who built the plant and the suppliers who delivered the equipment in accordance with the reports and recommendations of the competent inspectors on the scene. Mr. Rossiter observes that it is premature to say that the Georgetown affair has cost the province \$5,000,000, as payments are on a pay-as-you-go basis and that whole amount has not yet been reached and will not until the program is completed a couple of years from now.

EASIER FOR BACKERS
The Conservative MLA for 2nd Kings, who was one of the prime movers in the Shaw cabinet that established the new industry at Georgetown, feels that if the present provincial government would thus put its goodwill towards the Georgetown enterprise in writing it would be easier for Mr. Moe and his associates to get backers to raise enough money to get the Georgetown production lines going again.

He pointed out that the current money market is very tight but that a commitment from the Provincial government could do much to overcome such difficulties as well as provide indisputable evidence of the intent of the P.E.I. government and its people to see the Georgetown enterprise through.

Mr. Rossiter says that surveys by appropriate authorities indicated beforehand that the Georgetown concept was a viable one. Among those so convinced he points out, were the Findus interests who were prepared to absorb the complete production output of Georgetown fish for marketing in Europe.

But, as in most similar situations, the profitability potential of undertakings such as at Georgetown is based upon full production volume which, as Mr. Rossiter says, has not yet reached peak at the Kings town and was never expected to until all trawlers were delivered and fishing by sometime in 1968 or 1969, he company's administration has had to train staff for the production lines and other departments and recruit trawler crews and work them in. Along the line, what with the tight money market, the working capital petered out, Mr. Rossiter feels.

St. Eleanors Men Get Six Month Sentences

SUMMERSIDE — Allan Joseph Cormier, 17, of St. Eleanors, and Alvin Keith Williams, 18, of Springhill, were each sentenced to six months in the Prince County Jail yesterday by Judge Walter E. Darby, in Prince County Judge's Criminal Court.

Both were sentenced to six months on each of two charges, escaping the Prince County jail, and break, entry and theft at the Horsemen's Club in Summerside, the sentences to run concurrently, and to take effect from the expiration of the terms the two were serving at the time of the jail break.

Hearing of the charges took place November 29 and the cases were set over to yesterday for decision by the Judge. Judge Darby said the sentence would have been more severe, if he had not taken into consideration the youth of the accused. He emphasized the severity of the charges and the fact that the accused were getting a break by the sentence he was giving them. He said that with their present record, they would certainly be dealt with much more harshly if they were convicted in future in any criminal court.

Crown Prosecutor was George R. McMahon, while J. Melville Campbell represented the accused.

New School To Be Opened At St. Peters

ST. PETERS — A new consolidated school here, to serve seven districts, will be opened Dec. 13. The cornerstone will be laid by Premier Alex Campbell and the school opened officially by Education Minister Gordon Bennett.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College, will be guest speaker. Also taking part in the ceremonies will be Harold Hynes of Montague, superintendent of schools, and Keith Pickard, Charlottetown, architect for the new building.

CEREMONIES
Prayer at the beginning of the ceremonies will be offered by Rev. Donald MacLennan of the Mt. Stewart-St. Peter's United Church pastoral charge and benediction will be by Rev. Bennett MacDonald, parish priest at the St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church.

The new school, of permanent steel, concrete and brick construction, will have eight classrooms. In addition it will have a large auditorium, library, teachers' room and principal's office.

PROVISION
Provision has been made also for two additional classrooms when enrollment requires them. The auditorium is said to be the largest of the new schools built in Kings County this year and will be also the school gymnasium and a community centre. It is provided with an up-to-date kitchen.

DISTRICTS SERVED
Districts served by the school are: St. Peter's North and South, Fortune Road, Cable Head East, Southampton, Goose River and Farmington.

Ceremonies next Tuesday are scheduled to begin at 8 o'clock.

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
