Encouraging Reports Last Night At Annual Meeting Of P.C. Hospital

Encouraging and comprehensive reports were given at the annual meeting of the Prince County Hospital held last evening in the Town Hall in Summerside.

Upwards of 100 persons attended this meeting. The financial statement showed excess of expenditure over revenue to be \$16,151.34. This amount does not include depreciation.

Following the reading of the minutes by secretary, G.R. MacQuarrie, reports were received from the retiring president, J. Frank Arnett; superintendent of nurses, Miss Helen Schurman; Ladies Aid, Mrs. Heath Strong; Octo Club, Mrs. Reg Pope; Kensington Ladies Aid; auditor, T. E. Hickey; and the financial report was read.

Considerable discussion took place regarding criticism that had been made through the press and to canvassers, in connection with the Hospital Completion Fund drive. All of these criticisms and false reports were well and ably answered and explained by the doctors and hospital trustees.

It was announced that \$154,429.94 had been subscribed to the Completion Fund. Total expenses amounted to \$16,041.61; and cash received with subscriptions amounted to \$31,103.64.

A vote of appreciation was extended to J. E. Dalton, retiring after a record 30 years service on the board of trustees.

New President
A.A. Scales, at the unanimous and insistent request of the meeting, withdrew his letter of resignation as a member of the board, and later, in a special meeting of the board which followed the adjournment of the annual meeting, Mr. Scales was elected as new president of the board of trustees. Other officers elected were: 1st. vice-president, Donald Baker; 2nd. vice-president, Judge L. G. Lewis; 3rd. vice-president, J. Henry Gaudet; secretary, G.R. MacQuarrie; auditor, T. E. Hickey; medical representative, Dr. J.C. Simpson.

Newly elected to the board of trustees at last night's annual meeting were: (for 1 year) Alex Horne, Summerside, Alton Webb, O'Leary. (For 3 years) W. H. Hayward, Lorne Driscoll, Wilfred Kelly, R. S. Hinton, Henry Gaudet, all of Summerside; Hon. Joseph Bernard, Tignish; and Kenneth MacLean, Lot 16.

President's Report
In his report the retiring president, J. Frank Arnett, stated that the new hospital officially opened on August 20th, 1951.

"Our school of nursing," he said, "has been well maintained under the supervision of our superintendent and the instructress of nurses, Miss Marguerite Doyle. Sixteen nurses graduated in June of the present year. What this institution has meant to the sick and injured, the suffering, and the poor of the country during the past forty years, cold type can never tell," Mr. Arnett said.

One problem faced by the board is the shortage of nurses and he regretted that the response from certain districts throughout the country was disappointing. He said the board appreciated the very generous support received from the medical staff, the trustees, and many business firms, within and without the province, as well as certain districts which have gone over their objective in the present drive. He hoped that sections which had not reported up to the present, would complete their canvass within the next few weeks.

He gave the following figures in connection with the work done at the hospital in the past year: patient days 29,154; babies born 691; in-patients 3,654; out-patients 3,077; laboratory procedures 13,697; x-rays taken 3,936.

Mr. Arnett expressed the appreciation of the board to the Ladies Aides of Summerside and Kensington, the Octo Club, and the Ladies Auxiliary of the R. C. A. F., and all others for their untiring support during the year.

Superintendent's Report
Miss Helen Schurman, in the superintendent's report said that today the staff consists of 29 graduates, 19 students, and 10 ward-aids.

She said beds have increased from 74 adult and children to 105 beds, plus 24 bassinets. It has been remarked, she said, that the hospital is "overstaffed," but this is not the case, and every effort has been made to keep the staff, nursing and otherwise, at a minimum.

In describing the work within the hospital she said that 26,046 meals were served from February to May inclusive.

Well Known Summerside Man Dies

Death came peacefully yesterday morning at the Prince County Hospital to Ernest S. (Ike) Wright in his 49th year. Although for some years he had been in ill health and had undergone surgical operations and despite the best medical care available he was unable to regain his good health.

Regardless of the painful and crippling malady with which he was afflicted, he continued to carry on in his chosen occupation, radio and electric supplies, up to a few years ago. Due to his health, he was finally forced to give up his work. All his life he had been connected with the radio and electric business and for some years he operated under his own name. About ten years ago, in company with Mr. Ken Bell, he formed the Wright and Bell Electric Supplies Company. He was one of the first "radio hams" to operate in this part of Canada and he maintained his own station (VE1BD) up to the time of his death.

In company with Mr. Arthur Rogers, he was instrumental in bringing the Summerside radio station into being and the last call letter of the station (C J R W) represents his name.
