LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FAREWELL CONCERT.—Weather permitting Gaubraith's Band will give their farewell concert in Queen Square gardens tonight.

SCHOONER FLOATED.—The schooner Hattie M Graham, before reported stranded on Boughton Island, has been successfully floated and docked at Georgetown. She appears not much injured and will proceed to Pictou for repairs.

ALL SAINTS CHURCH.—A correspondent informs us that All Saints Church at Carleton Place, has been handsomely painted by Mr. James Edmonds, of Charlottetown, and adds that the spire was painted by Parker House Bill.

LADIES AID SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of the Ladies Aid Society of the P. E. Island Hospital will be held in St. Paul's Schoolroom on Thursday afternoon, Sept. 30th, at 4 o'clock. A full and punctual attendance of all ladies interested in the Hospital is requested.

APPRECIATED ABROAD.—The Robb Engineering Co. have received an order for three tandem compound engines, side crank, for export to Spain. These engines are to be direct connected to electric dynamos and were ordered by an English engineering firm for electric tramways at Barcelona and Madrid.—Halifax Herald

GOOD WORK.—The list of converts made by Hunter and Crossley at Parsboro during their three weeks work consists of three hundred and fifty one persons—184 men and boys and 167 women and girls. The net sum the evangelists received was about \$283, their expenses being about \$134. The thank offering on the last night amounted to \$121.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon John Benjamin Byers, a lad about eight years of age appeared to answer a charge of breaking the windows of the Baptist Church on Prince Street. He was remanded to jail for eight days.

John Sims, an article seaman, was charged with deserting his ship. He admitted the charge, but the prosecutor not appearing he was fined in the nominal sum of 5 cents and costs.

EPIDEMIC OF INFLUENZA.—The medical press warns the public against a probable recurrence of influenza. For months past that disease has been raging in severe form in the district of Merv, Turkestan. The number of victims is immense, and, although there are fewer deaths than formerly, the virulence of the epidemic is said to have increased rather than lessened. The latest reports show that the attack of influenza leaves severe results, such as heart affections, paralysis, etc.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOUR.—A meeting of representatives of the different Christian Endeavour societies of this city was held in Zion church last evening for the purpose of forming a local union of that organization for Charlottetown. The following officers were elected: Pres., Rev. D. Sutherland; Vice do, Misses G. Boyer, Annie S. Fraser, Messrs J. Chappell, Alfred Duchemin, Geo. W. Ritchie, Rev. W. J. Kirby; Secretary, Miss Annie Harris; Treasurer, John T. McKenzie.

NEWSPAPER SOLD.—The entire plant consisting of presses, type, etc., and every thing connected with the Progress newspaper, St. John, including the right to publish, was sold at public auction in the city of St. John on Friday. There was one solitary bid of \$4,500 and the property was knocked down to Mr. W. H. T. Fenety. The paper has been running for nearly ten years under Mr. E. S. Carter's ownership and management. Mr. Geo. E. Fenety held the mortgage.

MISSOURI NOTES.

Captain Jackson, the Boston millionaire, who has been the last few summers on the Island shooting and fishing, is so well pleased with the sport that he has purchased a dwelling house at Scuris, from W. Cantwell, intending to go housekeeping when he comes on next summer. He is having the house repaired, the carpenter work being done by W. R. Diogwell and the masonry work by M. Brehaut. A verandah all around the building with an old fashioned fire place inside are some of the improvements to be made.

Quite a serious accident happened on Monday last week to Lawrence Gallant, of New Acadia. He was engaged stumping when the pry flew up, striking him in the face and fracturing his lower jaw.

Work on Scuris breakwater has been discontinued for the present, the engineer in charge being of opinion that neither timber nor stone on hand is suitable for the repairs needed. The railway wharf there is said to be in a bad condition. If not repaired soon, accidents will surely follow. In some places it is unsafe to drive a team now, and how much more unsafe it will all be if not repaired before fall shipping is over, can be readily understood.

A number of American fishing schooners have lately arrived in the Bay. The celebrated mackerel killer, Captain Sol Jacobs is among the latest arrivals. His crew is made up almost entirely of captains of former years fishing craft. With such a crew back of his own proverbial good luck he expects to fill up before he strikes Gloucester again. We shall see.

It is pleasing to see the genial proprietor of the Kimball House about again after his severe illness.

J. T. Mellish, Esq., Barrister, etc., preached in the Methodist Church on Sunday last, morning and evening, the regular pastor, Rev. Mr. Ives, being absent on a visit to his friends at Tryon. Eloquence and argumentativeness, it is said, characterized both sermons.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York has been appointed commodore of three cruisers, and will take command of the first-class cruiser Terrible next April. According to the Times which makes the announcement, he will go with two fast second-class cruisers for a twelve-months' cruise, during which he will visit the principal colonies of the Empire.
