23rd Electrical Approvals Council Meeting Concludes

The members of the Electrical Approvals Council of the Canadian Standards Association concluded a very successful convention yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

This was their 23rd meeting and the first ever held on P.E.I. The Council, who give the CSA approvals laboratories the benefit of their national experience in their field of safeguarding the public in the widespread use and application of electrical energy and equipment, were called upon to consider some new and novel electrical equipment.

One such item consisted of a large generator mounted on a farm tractor, which will supply power to drive motor-driven farm equipment, operate welding machines, electric saws or serve as a source of electrical power to the homestead when the electricity from the power company fails.

Mr. G. Moes, manager of the CSA Approvals Laboratories, was convener for the convention and the next meeting will be held in Saskatchewan.
