PEKIN LEGATIONERS REPORTED SAFE

And About to Proceed to Tien Tsin.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY LISTENS TO THE CHINESE APPEAL

Will Mediate Between the Imperial Government and the Powers.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 24.—Sir Halliday Macartney, Counsellor and English Secretary to the Chinese Legation in London, asserted last evening that the Pekin legationers were safe and about to proceed to Tien Tsin.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The President has listened to the appeal of the Chinese Government as transmitted to Minister Wu and has signified his willingness to mediate between the Imperial government and the Powers, but only upon conditions which first must be met by the Chinese government.

The exact nature of the terms cannot be stated until tomorrow, when it is expected that publication will be made of the text of the Chinese appeal and the President's answer.

It is known, however, that the answer is entirely consistent with the statement of principles laid down by Secretary Bay in his identical note to the powers.

Moreover, it accepts as truthful the Chinese statements relative to the safety of foreign ministers at Pekin.

The Forgery Case.

ST. JOHN, July 24.—The preliminary examination of Fred S. Whittaker charged with uttering forged papers, was resumed yesterday, when Mr. Schofield, of the Bank of New Brunswick, preferred a charge against the prisoner of uttering a note bearing the name of his brother-in-law, Mr. E. G. Smith, of Halifax, for \$5,000.

The prisoner takes matters coolly. The examination was adjourned until Friday, when Smith will give evidence.

Yacht Atalanti Sold.

NEW YORK, July 23.—The big steam yacht Atalanti, built for the late Jay Gould, and owned since his death by George J. Gould, has been sold to the government of the United States of Columbia and will be converted into a gunboat. The purchase price has not been made public.

German Missionaries.

BERLIN, July 23.—The German consul at Swatow telegraphs under date of July 21, that all the German missionaries from the interior of the province of Kwang Tung have arrived there safely.

Making Ready for the Elections.

OTTAWA, July 24.—It is rumored here that the Hon. Mr. Burpee has resigned his seat in the Senate to accept a commissionership at the Paris Exhibition, representing New Brunswick. Mr. Donville is to succeed Burpee in the Senate, and Mr. Pugsley is to run for King's county.

It is said that Mr. Blair "fixed it all up" before he left for England, and it is understood that the mission of Sir Louis Davies and Messrs. Blair and Fielding to England, is to endeavor to secure a fast freight steamship service for St. John and Halifax in connection with the Intercolonial.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES.

Dangerous Wounds and Illness.

OTTAWA, July 24.—The following cable is from Sir Alfred Milner to Lord Minto:

CAPE TOWN, July 22.—I regret to report the following casualties: (66) Trooper A D V Crawley, dangerously wounded near Bethlehem, July 3rd; (186) Private R. Lett; (2,489) Sergeant A Wetmore, both died of enteric fever at Bloemfontein, July 11.

I regret to report the dangerous illness of (7,915) Corporal F. W. Coombs; (7,400) Private J. Wilson, both of the Canadian infantry (165) Private L. Mulley, First Battalion Canadian Mounted Rifles.

Very Fast Trotting.

A Deadly Mountain.

YOKOHAMA, July 22.—Mount Azuma, near Banda Jean, which was the scene of a volcano disaster in 1888, broke into eruption Tuesday, July 17. Two hundred persons were killed or injured. Several villages were engulfed by the streams of lava from Mount Azuma, and great damage was done in adjacent districts.

Sealing Combine.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 22.—The sealers have formed a joint stock company and will control forty-seven schooners now in business. They have a capital of half a million, their object being to regulate wages and keep up the prices of skins.

The Servant Question.

TORONTO, July 21.—The increasing difficulty in securing domestic servants, which is felt on every hand, may be due in part to the failure of one of the important sources of supply. Jacob Spence, chief of the Ontario immigration bureau said today that in recent years there had been a great falling off in the arrivals of young women. Fifteen years ago from 2,000 to 2,500 single young women came out yearly from the British Isles to Ontario, and were employed chiefly as domestics. Now very few women come out, and the young women of the country are so fully employed just now in industrial occupations that there is a remarkable scarcity of domestics.

Warning For Boys.

SYDNEY, July 23.—A three year old boy named Johnnie Macdonald, son of Charles Macdonald, formerly of Halifax, died this afternoon as the result of a kick received from a horse in Victoria park. The little fellow was playing in the park and approaching too near the horse received a kick, from the effects of which he died a few hours later.

LONDON, July 24.—The Daily Express has the following from Macadadodo, dated July 23: "There has been severe fighting during the last three days and the Boers have inflicted heavy losses upon the British at Deudepoort.

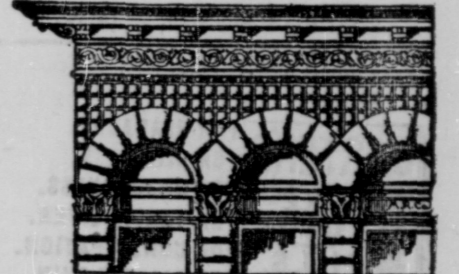
