

the aspect of the wool market, a brisk inquiry having been lately experienced, and considerable purchases of English wools have been made for America at a rise of a penny per pound on previous prices.

There is considerable animation in the manufactured iron trades at Stockton, Consett and Middlesborough. The recent activity in crude iron has only slightly diminished. The principal firms in North Staffordshire have again slightly advanced the prices of finished iron, and are in receipt of further large orders from the United States.

**OIL IN PENNSYLVANIA.**

McKean county, Pa., is suffering just now from over production of oil. The tanks are all full, and 150,000 gallons of crude petroleum are said to go to waste daily. The streams literally run with oil and the earth is saturated with it. Such quantities have been absorbed in some places that the ground is represented to be a mass of greasy mud several inches deep. In some places the oil is collected in ponds and burned as the only means of disposing of it.

**Trade with the Mother Country.**

STATISTICS obtained from official returns demonstrate that the imports of Canada from Great Britain have, this year, been much larger than they were last year. On the other hand, it is shown that the trade of Canada with the United States has decreased. The following is a statement showing the increase in the trade with Great Britain and the decrease in trade with the United States with respect to the two most important items of import, for the months of July and August, 1879, as compared with July and August, 1878:—

Stick to your own trade and calling is a good rule for both good and bad times. If every one would do so, it is certain that there would be less of bad times.

**Death of Hon. John R. Carroll.**

MANY of our readers will regret to hear of the death of Hon. John R. Carroll, which recently occurred in St. Louis. He was a native of this Province, being the oldest son of the late Mr. Patrick Carroll, of Pisiquid Road, Lot 49. When twenty years of age he left this Province to seek his fortune in the United States. His career in the land of his adoption has been most successful, and the following notices, clipped from St. Louis papers will show the esteem in which he was held by fellow citizens. The St. Louis Globe-Democrat remarks:—

"The death of Mr. Carroll was announced yesterday morning, and a more extended notice is perhaps due to his life and character. He was born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, received good educational advantages in his youth, left his home to seek his fortune, and arrived in St. Louis about twenty-three years ago. After about three years of clerical work he accepted a position in the house of Francis Fisher & Co., and seven years ago became a partner in the firm. Though never actively engaged in politics, at the solicitation of his friends he became a candidate for the Fourth District for the Lower House of the General Assembly, and was elected by a handsome plurality. Last winter he occupied prominent places on committees, and was respected in the halls of legislation as he was by his constituency. Mr. Carroll leaves a widow and two children, and other near relatives to mourn his decease. The immediate cause of his death was pneumonia, his illness covering a period of two months. He will be missed by his friends, as he will be from his pleasant and elegant home where he bade adieu to earth."

St. Louis Post-Dispatch:—"Hon. John R. Carroll, member of the Thirtieth General Assembly, died yesterday afternoon at his residence on Leonard avenue, near Easton avenue. He was forty-three years of age, and leaves a wife and two children. The immediate cause of his death was an affection of the lungs. Some time during the summer Mr. Carroll was attacked by rheumatism and went to the Hot Springs, where he took baths for some three weeks. This hastened the disease that already seized upon his lungs. Mr. Carroll was a well known

and popular citizen. Many years ago he was connected with the dry goods house of McCarron & Fisher, on Main street. He was finally a member of the firm and remained with it till its dissolution. Mr. Carroll then became connected with the dry goods house of A. Frank & Sons, on Washington avenue. Last fall he was elected to the Legislature on the Democratic ticket, and distinguished himself by casting the vote in caucus that decided the nomination of George Vest to the United States Senate. His course during the whole session of the Legislature was such as to make him many warm friends among his colleagues. The esteem in which he was held by St. Louis delegation will be seen by the notice below."

The St. Louis Delegation of the Thirtieth General Assembly held a meeting on the evening of Mr. Carroll's death. Speeches were made eulogistic of the deceased, and resolutions of condolence were adopted.

ANOTHER incendiary fire was lit last evening at a quarter past six o'clock. This time in the hayloft of a stable owned by Mr. Hugh Monaghan, situated on Grafton Street—not fifty yards from the one set on fire Sunday evening. The fire was fortunately discovered before it made much progress, and a few buckets of water totally quenched the flame. "Big Donald" sounded the alarm; the engines turned out; and a vast crowd of people thronged Grafton Street for hours. Singular, too, the incendiary again escaped without leaving a trace or clue. He is, no doubt, seized with a mania for burning buildings in that vicinity; and the authorities should lose no time in hunting him down.

The year 1881 will be a mathematical curiosity. From left to right and from right to left, it reads the same; 18 divided by 2 gives 9 as a quotient; 81 divided by 9 and 9 is the quotient. If 1881 is divided by 209, 9 is the quotient; if divided by 9, the product contains two 9s. One and 8 are 9; 8 and 1 are 9. If the 18 be placed under the 81 and added, the sum is 99. If the figures be added thus, 1, 8, 8, 1, it will give 18. Reading from left to right is 18, and 18 is two-ninths of 81. By adding, dividing and multiplying nineteen 9s are produced, being one 9 for each year required to complete the century.

A LARGE and appreciative audience greeted those old friends, Mr. and Mrs. George Case (Grace Egerton) on their reappearance at the Market Hall, last evening, after an absence of six years; and certified by their enthusiastic applause and laughter, how much they enjoyed the entertainment presented to them. This latter is a magnificent production, and evidently brought out the well known patriotism of the little Island. Being given in a splendid costume as "Britannia," added much to the effect, and when the fair artists waved the pretty silk "Union Jack," the audience fairly cheered and insisted on a repetition of the last verse. This song alone is worth going to the hall to hear. Space will not allow us to dwell on the many amusing features given last night; especially so was Dicken's scene between Betsy Prig and Sairey Gamp by Mr. and Mrs. Case; this convulsed the audience. The elegant and distinguished "Belle of Broadway" entranced them, while the "Wizard" in a beautiful Indian costume astonished them. Little Dolly Dolt (Mr. and Mrs. Case's infant daughter) now contributes her share to this amusing performance. She sang charmingly "My Grandfather's Clock" and, in character, "Real Jam," a most attractive little song which was rendered so well that it brought down the house and had to be repeated. This pretty little artist displays so much talent that we predict she will eventually emulate her talented parent. The performance concluded with a very laughable comic sketch—"Married and Settled"—in which Mr. and Mrs. Case kept the audience in one continuous roar of laughter. Mr. Case's solos were, as usual, all that could be desired. There is to be one more performance (to-morrow evening) when these talented impersonators are to appear for positively the last time. A new entertainment is to be produced for the first time here, and a Carte de Visite of Grace Egerton is to be presented with every reserved seat ticket. These are elegant souvenirs and we are certain there will be a great demand for them.
