Rape Case Hearing Before Petit Jury

First day of the trial of Heath William Bowley, Parkdale, is over. He was arraigned before Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGulgan at the first day of Queens County Assizes on Tuesday, when the Grand Jury of the Supreme Court brought in a true bill on the charge of rape, and the trial opened yesterday before the Petit Jury.

Immediately after the jury was settled, defense made application for withdrawal of all witnesses from the courtroom until after they had returned evidence. The application was accepted by Justice MacGulgan, and all witnesses present withdrew to the witness' room to await call.

Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur MacGulgan called the prosecution's first witness, Janice Mary MacKay, a steno-graphist with the RCMP crime detection laboratory in Saskville, New Brunswick. She testified as to the results of tests carried out by her on the exhibit designated C2 when it was delivered to her in the late of 1962.

The second witness called was Dr. Arthur L. Roberts, of Charlottetown, who testified that he had called on a physical examination of Mrs. MacLaughlin on the night of Oct. 29 in the outpatient department of the P.E.I. Hospital. He reported that he had found bruising but no lacerations on the head near the eyes, and on the legs.

The afternoon session began with the calling of the complainant, Eleanor Melody (Mrs. Ed) MacLaughlin, who gave as her address 206 Fitzroy Street in the City. After identifying herself she proceeded to relate an account of the events of the day in question, Oct. 28, and the following day.

When the proceeding was finished, Mr. Nicholson took over and proceeded with thorough cross-examination of the witness, which did not terminate by the time Mr. MacGulgan recessed the Court. Continuation of the cross-examination will take place this morning at 10:30 when Court resumes.
